





Hope that the IADVL members find this book useful, and it will offer them enjoyable and memorable experience.






It is to be hoped that this sturdy child will grow rapidly into a stalwart adult.



The year 1947 is close to heart for two special reasons of solidarity - our country's new found Independence and also the First National Conference of Dermatologists and Venereologists at JJ Hospital Bombay.

At this very conference, the first national organization of dermatologists was enshrined- which would seek public opinion, furnish a stage for discussion, cooperation and research and serve as a voice for all. But all was not smooth sailing, any many obstacles laid ahead.

In the early seventies an internal rift, resulted in the walling off of dermatology from venereology; erecting the dermatologic society of India. Also prevalent was a hesitation in welcoming venereology and dermatology as a separate subject in conservative Institutes. To disillusion the world and showcase the extravagance and beauty of our field, we organized our conferences in fraternization with the Associations of Physicians of India.

Luckily, this dark period was short lived. In 1973 we welcomed back and incorporated our sister organization, jubilantly commemorating our organisation in its present form.

This was later in Udaipur, coronated as the "Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (IADVL)", as we know it today.

The early 90s we ushered in democracy with a fervour for representation; decorating our organisation and journal with the voices of elected members from across the country. A paradigm of transparency and unambiguity reflected in our administration with the penning of annexures, by-laws and crystal centre state relationships in our constitution.

With backbreaking effort an impressive directory of members was inscribed, bringing members closer than ever before.

Since long we had made our presence felt globally. In as early as 1976, we had collaborated with the international society of tropical dermatology working on pigmentary dermatosis. We integrated with them in 1994 and with the South Asian Regional Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (SARAD) in 1997. With this impetus, we created our very first website. Although initially crafted to facilitate the 30th IADVL conference, curiosity and out of the box thinking culminated in its continued existence.



The avant-garde website of IADVL (2004) and it has been expanding ever since, housing celestial amounts of information about IADVL, awards and events.

The organization stood the test of time, holding the hands of its members through thick and thin. Our DVL Trust and social security scheme were a boon and gave a footing amidst the great recession. It has fended the rights and safety of dermatologists in legal disputes and grants indemnity insurance. Patients can bravely receive treatment under the shade of its anti-quackery movements.








Establishment of IADVL

The Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (IADVL), the official society representing Indian dermatologists, is the 2^{nd} largest society of dermatologists after the American Academy of Dermatology.

Founding of the IADVL

In 1935, Dr. U. B. Narayan Rao conceived the idea for an association of Dermatologists and Venereologists.




Dr. U. B. Narayanan Rao

He was supported in this endeavour by, among others, Dr. P. Natesan, Professor of Venereology, Stanley Medical College, Madras. On 1st July 1947, the Bombay Association was inaugurated by Shri Morarji M. Desai at Seth GS Medical College, Bombay. The association held an "All-India Conference of Dermatologists and Venereologists" on December 27th and 28th, 1947, at the JJ Hospital, Bombay

The 1st inaugural session of the All-India association of Dermatologists and Venereologists of India at Bombay in 1947





On 28th December 1947, the first "All-India Conference of Dermatologists and Venereologists" resolved to transform itself into an "All-India Association of Dermatologists and Venereologists (IADV)" with 34 members with the aim to promote the study and research in the field, to create public opinion on prevention and cure of dermatology diseases, and to promote professional fellowship and exchange of ideas among members.

The association suffered a setback during the period 1956-1960 due to issues related to the association's work. The members of the Calcutta branch parted company from the association and formed the Dermatological Society of India (DSI). Following conciliatory efforts made by concerned members, the two bodies finally met at Udaipur on 28th January 1973 and amalgamated into one association. The Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (IADVL) as we know it today was registered at Varanasi on 8th May 1975 under the Societies Registration Act. Professor B. N. Banerjee was unanimously appointed the first president of IADVL, and Dr. L. K. Bhutani was made the first Honorary General Secretary of the association.

Initially, no formal elections of the central council of members or the state branches were held. The office bearers were chosen by consensus and goodwill under the recommendations of the committee of three senior members. A comprehensive constitution was drafted by Dr. A. Krishna, in 1982, to avoid confrontations and misconceptions. This ushered in the era of democracy in the association. It redefined the relationship between the centre and the state branches. It recommended yearly elections through postal ballot under the watchful eye of the returning officer.







The vision is IADVL is to provide quality Dermatology healthcare for the community, continuing medical education to and advocacy on behalf of the members, speciality, and patients. It endeavours to impart an identity to the speciality, recognizes the work of senior academicians, and encourages the youngsters to improve their academic knowledge through its official journal, guest lectures, Continuing Medical Education (CME) programs, and awarding medals and prizes. Of course, the objective of service to the community remains foremost.

As per a resolution of the IADVL General Body, all national conferences of the IADVL are known as DERMACON, all state conferences as CUTICON, and all zonal conferences as DERMAZONE. The mid-annual conference of IADVL is called MID-DERMACON. The national conference begins with the installation of the new office bearers, followed by the presidential address. The scientific sessions are comprised of guest lectures, paper sessions, panel discussions, competition sessions for the post-graduates and poster sessions. Orations and medals are awarded to deserving candidates.

The state branches usually hold a monthly meeting. The host institutions present interesting clinical cases, which are kept either for demonstration to the youngsters or for taking the opinion of the house on their diagnosis and management. A CME is presented in some of these meetings. Each state branch also organizes a midyear symposium and an annual conference. The scientific sessions consist of paper presentations and panel discussions. The election of the executives of the state branch also takes place at this annual conference.

In 2001, the IADVL website (www.iadvl.com) was initially created before the 30th National Conference of the IADVL held at Kochi, Kerala. In 2006, a full-fledged IADVL website committee was formed, and the official new website www.iadvl.org was launched during CC MIDERMAMEET 2006 at Hyderabad on 6th August. This is a dynamic


and interactive site loaded with all the information about IADVL and all the forthcoming conferences and workshops within and outside the country, with information about all awards, prizes, scholarships, etc. The new and updated official website has completely revolutionized the day-to-day administrative works of the association and ushered in e-governance in IADVL. The initial directory of members of IADVL was published by the Gujarat State Branch, and now the current directory of more than 14,000 members is digitized.

IADVL offers various training fellowships, and young members receive various international scholarships. "IADVL Academy of Dermatology" was instituted to promote discussion in dermatology. IADVL has an online support system for researchers in dermatology called "IADVL Clinical Research Helpline" for its members. IADVL has also established Special Interest Groups (SIGs) in aesthetics, dermatology clinical research, dermatopathology, dermoscopy, dermatosurgery, female genital dermatoses, lasers, leprosy, neglected tropical diseases, pediatric dermatology, pigmentary diseases, pruritus, psoriasis, recalcitrant dermatophytosis, and trichology and hair transplantation. In addition, IADVL has published multiple textbooks including the widely acclaimed "IADVL Textbook of Dermatology". IADVL has also created an online learning resource centre at https:// iadvl.mediknit.org/ for its members which includes access to online training modules, dermgyan lecture series, various workshops, and webinars. IADVL also published Indian Journal of Dermatology, Venereology and Leprology (IJDVL) and Indian Dermatology Online Journal (IDOJ). IJDVL is the highest rated scholarly journal published from India.

IADVL is an official partner of the National Leprosy Eradication Programme of the Government of India and collaborates with it to reduce the transmission of leprosy. IADVL constituted IADVL Taskforce Against Topical Steroid Abuse (ITATSA) to combat the rampant misuse of topical steroid creams. IADVL established IADVL Taskforce Against Quackery (ITAQ) to deal with quackery and take necessary steps with various statutory authorities against quacks claiming themselves as Skin Specialists/ Cosmetologists/ Aestheticians. IADVL also started member welfare activities in 2019 as a part of the Presidential programme.

IADVL is an active member of the South Asian Regional Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (SARAD), formed by the member countries of the South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation. IADVL is also an important member of the International League of Dermatological Societies (ILDS).

Let us hope that the present and future generations continue the glorious tradition of IADVL and render better services to all its members and society.







CHAPTER 6

Evolution of Constitution of IADVL


The Constitution of IADVL is a written document, which is the supreme legal framework of the association and contains rules and bye laws for the governance of the association. It contains the memorandum and articles of the Association. It is the duty of the President and other office bearers as well as the members of the Central Council of the association to ensure that the activities of the Association are conducted as per the provisions of these rules and bye-laws. It is also the privilege and duty of the members of the Association to follow the constitution.

The general secretary is the Coordinator of the Constitution and it is he/she who points out the rules at the meetings of the Association.

The Constitution of IADVL has been operative from the day of the inception of the Association. The Rules and Bye Laws have been amended from time to time. Down the years the IADVL National Executive have made extensive efforts to keep the members updated about these amendments and six editions of the Constitution have been published so far. The following brief history places on record the massive efforts that have gone into keeping the Constitution up to date and in conformity with the changing times.

1975: After the formation of IADVL in 1973, the rules and bye-laws of the Association were formulated and became operative during the same year. These rules were signed and printed on April 4, 1975 and

submitted along with the application for registration to the Registrar of Societies at Lucknow under the Registration of Societies Act. IADVL was subsequently registered at Lucknow on 8th May, 1975 under the Societies Registration Act 21 of 1960 (Registration No 270-1975-76, NO.7 60/1-35960/Lucknow, dated 19-5-1975). The registered office was at Varanasi (C/o Dr. Gurmohan Singh, Professor and Head of Department of Dermatology, BHU, Varanasi) The seven signatories (who signed the historic document were) Dr. R.P.C. Naik Dr. Gurmohan Singh Dr. Z. Ansari Dr. S.N. Srivastava Dr. K.G. Pillai Dr. P. Kaur Dr. R.P. Okhandiar

RULES AND BYE-LAWS

Part 1: RULES AND REGULATIONS

I. Name

The name of the Association shall be "The Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists".

2. Registered Office

The registered office of the Association for the present and until any further change will be in the city of New Dalls.

3. Aims and Objects

The aims and objects of the Association shall be >

(a) To promote the study of and research in Dermatology, Venereology, Leprosy and allied subjects.

(b) To create public opinion in matters relating to the prevention and cure of these diseases in all their aspects.

(c) To promote professional fellowship co-speration and exchange of views arrought members and to safeguard their interest in different spheres of their activities.

(d) To carry on such publicity as may be found necessary or feasible for attainment of these objects.

(e) To co-operate and/or affiliate with medicals and other institutions having altogether or in part similar objects.

(f) To open and maintain a library, when ever possible.

1983: The Constitution was updated in 1983 by the then President Dr. A. Krishna and the Honorary General Secretary Dr. K. Siddappa. It was almost rewritten with the help of Dr. Krishna's advocate friends. All the amendments passed till that year were incorporated into the new version. The Chairperson of the Constitution Committee was Dr. A. Krishna. The other members of Constitution Committee were Dr. T. Gopinathan, Calicut, Dr C.K. Jagavkar, Mumbai, Dr K. Siddappa, Davangare, and Dr Sujit Kumar, Calicut


1992: The next revision of the Constitution was published in 1992 when Dr. V.N. Sehgal was the President of IADVL and Dr. Dinesh Mathur was the Honorary General Secretary with the help of M/s Glenmark who had the copies of the Constitution duplicated and sent to all the members of IADVL.




1996: Four years later in 1996, the next revision of the Constitution was published under the aegis of the President Dr. J.S. Pasricha, Immediate Past President Dr. R.P. Okhandiar, President-Elect Dr. Kalyan Banerjee, Honorary General Secretary Dr. Suresh P. Joshipura and Honorary Treasurer Dr. Janak Thakkar. Dr. D.K. Gupta was the Chairperson Siddappa et al.: of Constitution Committee with Dr. K. Siddappa and Dr. R.P. Okhandiar as the other Committee Members. Dr Suresh P. Joshipura generously volunteered to get the copies duplicated, filed and sent under Certificate of Posting to all the members. No sponsors were involved for the publication of this edition of the Constitution. The practice of adding the Annexure after the Rules and Bye-laws started from this issue.



2000: The fifth revision of the Constitution was published in 2000 when Dr. Ganesh Pai was the President. Dr. Rishi Bhargav was the immediate past President and Dr. Bhushan Kumar was the President Elect. Dr. Amar Kant Jha Amar was the Honorary General Secretary and Dr. P.K. Roy was the Treasurer. The Constitution Committee was the same as in the earlier edition of the Constitution.



2006: The sixth revision was published in 2006. It was a Herculean task initiated by the Chairperson Dr. K. Siddappa who wrote the entire Constitution and edited it in long hand without the help of a computer. The other members of the Constitution Committee at that time were Dr. R.G. Valia, Dr. R.P. Okhandiar, Dr. Amar Kant Jha Amar, Dr. D.K. Gupta and Dr. K.K. Rajababu. The President Dr. Suresh P. Joshipura, Honorary General Secretary Dr. Koushik Lahiri and Honorary Treasurer Dr. Arijit Coondoo made extensive efforts to review, edit and completely update the Constitution till the date of its publication. They were fully supported in these efforts by the Immediate past President Dr. V.P. Kuriyipe, the President Elect Dr. Chetan Oberai and the Immediate Past Honorary General Secretary Dr. S Sacchidanand. M/s Palsons Drugs were the Sponsors of this issue.



2010: The seventh revision was published in 2010 under the guidance of the Chairperson Dr. R G Valia and Convenor Dr. Suresh Joshipura.



2015: The eighth edition of the Constitution was published in January 2015 incorporating all the data till 2014. Chairperson was Dr. Arijit Coondoo, Convenor Dr. Rajeev Sharma



2019: The ninth edition of the Constitution was published in January 2019, during DERMACON 2019 incorporating all the data till 2018. Chairperson was Dr. Arijit Coondoo, Convenor Dr. K Anuradha Babu

Some Historical amendments to the Constitution and Bye-Laws of IADVL

Duration of Conferences:

Conferences should be held for 3 days instead of 2 days and pre conference workshop and courses should be organized. This was proposed by Professor BN Banerjee and accepted at VI National conference at Calcutta 1978.

Dissolution of branches:

Earlier there was no provision in the constitution for dissolution of branches. An amendment regarding dissolution of State Branches of IADVL, which were not functioning at all or not functioning properly was accepted at VIII National conference at Goa in 1980.

Honorary General Secretary and Treasurer should be from the same place. The two should contest the election as a team and there should be only a single vote for the two. This proposal was passed at the IX National Conference at Indore in 1981.

President Elect:

In the original constitution, the office bearers of IADVL were the President, the two Vice Presidents, the Honorary General Secretary, the Treasurer and the two Joint Secretaries. The provision for President-elect was introduced through a constitutional amendment at the VI National Conference at Calcutta in 1978.

Permanent invitees to the Central Council:

During the IADVL National Conference of 1994, it was decided that all the Past Presidents and Past Secretaries would be invited members of the Central Council permanently. From 2006 all the Past Treasurers have also been made permanent Invited Members of the Central Council.

Dermacon, Dermazone, Cuticon:

In 2003 in the General Body Meeting that the IADVL National Conferences be renamed as DERMACONs, which was approved. After that IADVL National Conference is known as DERMACON. This was proposed by Dr. Koushik Lahiri . Kolkata conference of 2003 was the first DERMACON in the history.

As per the resolution passed in the combined CCM and GBM of commencing year 2005 based on the proposal of Dr. Koushik Lahiri all future zonal conferences were named as DERMAZONE and state conferences as CUTICON respectively. Incidentally DERMAZONE 2000(EAST) was the first DERMAZONE and CUTICON WB 2004 was the first CUTICON in IADVL history.

IADVL Academy of Dermatology:

In the concluding year of AGBM of 2005 at Hyderabad, the proposal of a dedicated Academy under IADVL by Dr. Koushik Lahiri was moved. This was accepted in the combined CCM and GBM of the commencing year 2006 at the same Hyderabad conference. Dr. Arun Inamadar was entrusted with drafting the detailed structure and scope of the IADVL academy

Online Voting:

Proposal for Online voting passed by AGBM at DERMACON 2011 at Gurgaon and included in Constitution. During this time(2010-12) the constitution committee Chairperson Dr. R G Valia, and Convenor Dr. Suresh Joshipura.

IADVL SOPs:

In January 2012, the proposal for developing and documenting IADVL SOPs was passed by AGBM at DERMACON 2012 Jaipur. At that time, the Chairperson was Dr. Suresh Joshipura, Convenor 2012 was Dr. Ameet Valia, and Convenor 2013 was Dr. Koushik Lahiri.

Renaming subbranches, city or town branches:

Proposal for renaming subbranches, city or town branches with IADVL prefixed to the names passed at AGBM 2013.

SOPs included as Annexure:

SOP formulated by SOP Committee accepted by AGBM and included as Annexure in the Constitution IN 2014.

Proposal for MOU with DERMACON organizers:

Proposal for MOU with DERMACON organizers passed by AGBM and included in Constitution. Chairperson was Dr. Arijit Coondoo, and Convenor was Rajeev Sharma.

2014-15

The Meeting of the Constitution Committee was held in Mumbai under the Presidentship of Dr. Deepak Parikh, with President-elect Venkatram Mysore and Hon General Secretary Dr. Rashmi Sarkar, and all members of the Constitution Committee, including the Chairperson and Convenor, attending the meeting. Roadmap for publication of updated Constitution 2014 was the principal agenda Proposal to invite past 15 years Presidents, Secretaries and Treasurers to CCMIDDERMAMEET passed in 2016, Chairperson: Dr. Arijit Coondoo, Convenor Dr. Rajeev Sharma.

Compulsory e-voting: The decision to shift to compulsory e-voting within the next 3 years was passed by AGBM in January 2016.

IADVL Headquarter at Delhi: The decision to establish a permanent IADVL Headquarter office in Delhi was passed by AGBM.

Residents 'Welfare Committee passed in 2013 AGBM Decision to change the nomenclature of General Secretary to Secretary-General passed by AGBM- 2015.

2017-18

Proposal to establish posts of Hon Secretary General elect and Hon Treasurer elect Proposal to delink MIDDERMACON from CCM

Proposal to purchase land for building for establishment of IADVL HQ

All these three happened in 2017-18 when the Chairperson was Dr. Deepak Parikh and Convenor Dr. Raghunatha Reddy

2018-19

Proposal to purchase property at Kaushambhi, Gaziabad

Proposal for Permanent residence in India for at least 5 continuous years to be an eligibility

Criterion for contesting elections in IADVL

Proposal for new vision and mission statement of IADVL

Proposal for new logo for IADVL accepted by AGBM

Compulsory e-voting introduced

During this time Chairperson was Dr. Jayadev Betkerur (Feb to June 2018) and then Dr. Arit Coondoo (June 2018-January 2019)

2019-20



The proposal for a reduced voting period and counting of votes at IADVL HQ passed at AGBM. Proposal to hold DERMACON International once in four years passed by AGBM.

Peacock blue color accepted as the theme color of the Association. LOGO, Constitution book, IADVL News, IJDVL, IDOJ, and Website will use this color principally and prominently.

During this time, the Chairperson was Dr. Ameet Valia Convenor, Dr. Subodh Sirur (February 2019-April 2019), and Dr. K Anuradha Babu (April 2019-January 2020)

January 2021

Proposal to publish the Constitution digitally every year and a limited number of hard copies to be published every fourth year passed by AGBM

AGBM decided to delete the Annexure containing SOPs from the Constitution.

January 2022:

AGBM accepted the Presidential programs of golden jubilee celebrations (including publication of Golden Jubilee Coffee table history book), Starting of mentorship (Guruderma) project, introducing quizzes for undergraduates, and NABH accreditation for Dermatology clinics and daycare centres.

During this time, Chairperson was Dr. Venkatram Mysore, and Convenor was Dr. K Anuradha Babu.

CHAPTER 7

IADVL Headquarters

In The CC meeting in 2015, Dr. Rashmi Sarkar, the then Secretary General of IADVL, was reading the IADVL Office Search Report.



With the IADVL office functioning out of the Honorary Secretary General's "own office," if we may call it so, until then, a place on the rent was decided upon in Kolkata, Bangalore, or Delhi for the setting up of a dedicated Headquarters of the by then flourishing Asociation, the IADVL.

The Central Council Committee passed this offer, and the majority vote was in favor of this proposal



This idea was floated and before it was approved, Dr. Mukesh Girdhar, the then President of the IADVL Delhi State Branch (DSB), in 2015, offered the office of the DSB at zero rental to be used as the National IADVL Headquarters.

The Executive Committee members of the DSB also passed the proposal unanimously, and the first-ever headquarters of the National IADVL was established at Darya Ganj, Delhi, in 2016. By then, the office bearers at the National and State levels had changed, with Dr. Devesh Mishra as the President of IADVL and Dr. Rishi Parashar as the President of the Delhi State Branch.

And this not "The End"...... The story continues......

In 2017, a year or so later after sharing premises of the IADVL DSB as its National Headquarters, looking at the mammoth of an association it was growing into, with a lot of official work pertaining to academics and para academics such as liaisons and information dissemination becoming inherent to the association, it was proposed in the GBM in 2017 that a permanent place in Delhi or NCR with a larger premises be found, to carry out the administrative work of the IADVL. It was decided to buy a plot in the locality of Dwarka in Delhi and construct the office there.

When this proposal was put up in the GBM in 2018, the then Vice President of the National IADVL, Dr. Mukesh Girdhar, highlighted certain roadblocks to the proposal in terms supervising the construction, passing of tenders, etc. and proposed the acquiring of an office space rather than constructing the same. He suggested buying one in a 5-star hotel where the IADVL had to pay only the maintenance charges of running the place. This proposal was approved by the majority.


A committee of some senior members and EC members comprising of Ex-Presidents, like Dr. V.P. Kuriype, Dr. V. K. Sharma, Dr. Jaydev Betkerur, Dr. M. A. Seetharam Secretary General Late Dr. Uma Shankar was formed to conduct a recce of the same in the trade tower of Radisson Blu Hotel, Ghaziabad.

Three offices in the building, Nos. 314, 315 and 316 were identified, covering an area of 11000-12000 sqft.

After deliberations, the members of the recce committee decided upon a smaller area and offices no. 314 and 315 were marked and purchased, totaling an area of 6000 sq ft.

With no one staking claim or objection to the property to the notice about the same floated in the newspapers, the new baby of the IADVL headquarters was born.

CHAPTER 8

IADVL Official Logo, Colour, Vision, Mission, Uniform Conference Nomenclature.

IADVL, one among the largest professional Association of qualified Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists in the world, boasts of having its own logo, official colour for the association, along with Mission and Vision statement. IADVL also has a uniform conference nomenclature.

First IADVL Logo:

The importance of a logo was felt by the thought leaders of IADVL after the inception of the organization in 1973. The making of the IADVL logo was a team effort. Designs were invited from State Branches. Component of designs made by Dr. S. B. Mondal and Late Dr. Basudev Chawdhury were incorporated in the final design of the IADVL logo.

The significance of the content of the first IADVL Logo

The official logo is vertically oval in shape and symbolizes the composite nature of the discipline. The left inner circle contains a histological picture of epidermis and dermis signifying Dermatology. Cupid is believed to be the God of love (Kamadeva). The Cupid's bow at the bottom indicates Venereology. Rays of hope radiating from flower petals on the right imply the joy and ecstasy after coming out from the agony and humiliation of Leprosy. The Hippocratic symbol superimposed on a map of India indicates that the association of medical professionals will spread to every nook and corner of this country.

The final logo adopted in 1974 evolved through the fine tuning of the original logo made in 1973.

In the year 2018 at the Combined Central Council Meeting and Closing Annual General Body Meeting of IADVL at DERMACON 2018, Cochin a proposal was moved by Dr Dinesh Kumar Devaraj to change the IADVL logo as the logo featured the Rod of Caduceus (Symbol of Commerce) which is used erroneously as the Symbol of Medicine. The correct symbol of Medicine and Healthcare being Rod of Asclepius. The IADVL logo was changed following the decision of the CCM & Closing AGBM held at DERMACON 2018, Cochin.

The IADVL EC of 2018 under the Presidentship of Dr. Ramesh Bhat invited applications from IADVL members to design the logo. A large number of applications were received and discussed within the EC. The EC felt a need to have a logo with modern design keeping in tune with the current times. Dr. Prashant Palwade, Joint Secretary 2018 designed the new IADVL Logo with inputs from Dr. Dinesh Kumar Devaraj, Joint Secretary 2018 and other 2018 EC members.

The significance of the content of the new IADVL Logo

The globe, which is split in two halves, represents the symbol Earth and IADVL, written in its centre, represents the association's ever-growing international presence in the field of dermatology, venereology and leprology. The outer ring is a representation of the skin as a protective organ of the human body, while the expanded form of IADVL parallel to this outer circle represents the association's responsibility for caring for the skin.

The new logo was unanimously approved by the general body during Combined Central Council Meeting and closing annual general body meeting of IADVL at Dermacon International 2019, Bengaluru.

It is adopted in IADVL constitution that: "IADVL logo has to be prominently displayed in all official correspondence, leaflets, brochures, abstract books, souvenirs, on the stage and on the dais. It should also be displayed on any banner used for the purpose of the conference / CME and all IADVL activities."

Official IADVL Colour

Dr. Ramesh Bhat, President IADVL 2018, felt a need for IADVL to have its own representative colour which could be used officially and proposed the same to IADVL.

The peacock blue colour as the official IADVL colour was suggested by Dr. Narendra Kamath. The Peacock Blue colour being a mixture of green and blue, has the expansive nature of green representing life and renewal and the soothing, calm effect of blue representing serenity. The colour has the power to give us confidence and strength. It is adopted in the Constitution that the official colour of IADVL, the peacock blue shall be used in it the IADVL logo, Constitution book, IADVL News, IJDVL, IDOJ and website principally and prominently.



The IADVL logo and IADVL colour convey deep meaning about IADVL values and communicates its vision, quality, and values.

The final draft was passed through an English literature expert and the legal retainer of IADVL and placed before the IADVL General Body for approval. The Combined Central Council Meeting and Closing Annual General Body Meeting of IADVL at DERMACON INTERNATIONAL 2019, Bengaluru approved the below Vision and Mission Statement of IADVL which is incorporated in the IADVL Constitution.




Nomenclature of IADVL Conferences

The annual conference of IADVL is a flagship event and much sought out for its rich academic, cultural, culinary feast and also for social and business networking.

The conference provides an opportunity to members of all parts of the country to meet, to make, or renew friendships, and to present their scientific data, to share knowledge, exchange ideas, to analyse the findings of different researchers, and to fulfil the constitutional obligations of the association. They also allow critical evaluation of newer entities, to encourage young dermatologists to undertake research and also to encourage friendship and fellowship amongst colleagues.

An All India Conference of Dermatologists and Venereologists was conducted on December 27 and 28, 1947, at J. J. Hospital, Bombay.

The second All India Conference of Dermatology and Venereology was held in Calcutta on April 14 and 15, 1951. The third conference was held in Madras in December 1956. Since then, the conferences used to be held along with conferences of Association of Physicians of India (API).

Although IADVL was formalized in 1973, its conferences continued to be held with those of the API. Separation from API conferences occurred only in 1975, when Dr. B. M. Ambadi organized the National Conference at Trivandrum. The annual conferences were named and numbered from the year, the Udaipur conference being called 1^{st} National Conference of IADVL (1973), the Patna conference being called 2^{nd} national Conference of IADVL (1974), the Trivandrum conference being called 3^{rd} National Conference of IADVL (1975) and henceforth.

At the 31st National Conference of IADVL at Kolkata, Dr. Koushik Lahiri proposed in the General Body Meeting that the IADVL National Conferences be renamed as DERMACON, which was approved. The 31st National Conference of IADVL at Kolkata of 2003 was the first DERMACON in the history of IADVL.

Given below are some innovative names given to some of our national conferences:



National Conference along with International Congresses:

The 22nd National Conference of IADVL was conducted along with the VII International Congress of Dermatology at New Delhi in the year 1994. Similarly, the 42nd National Conference of IADVL, DERMACON 2014 was conducted along with the XI International Congress of Dermatology at New Delhi on December 2013.

At the 45th National Conference of IADVL, DERMACON 2017 Dr. Yogesh Marfatia proposed that the DERMACON, once every four years be organized as DERMACON INTERNATIONAL in the year of the World Congress of Dermatology. The same was approved and the first DERMACON INTERNATIONAL was held at Bengaluru in the year 2019 as DERMACON INTERNATIONAL 2019, Bengaluru. The next DERMACON INTERNATIONAL will be held at Mumbai in the year 2023.

As per the resolution passed in the combined CCM and GBM of commencing year 2005 based on the proposal of Dr. Koushik Lahiri along with suggestions from Dr. S Sacchidanand and other seniors, all future zonal conferences were named as DERMAZONE and state conferences as CUTICON. Incidentally DERMAZONE 2000 (EAST) was the first DERMAZONE and CUTICON WB 2004 was the first CUTICON in IADVL history.

In the year 2012 it was proposed to conduct a mid-year annual conference of IADVL and it was to be named as MIDDERMACON. The proposal was passed in the AGBM. The first MIDDERMACON was conducted in Hyderabad in the year 2012. The proposal of Dr. Venkataram Mysore to de-link the Central Council Meeting and Academy Meeting from MIDDERMACON was approved by the General Body in the combined CCM and closing AGBM at DERMACON 2017, Kolkata. The decision was implemented from MIDDERMACON 2017, Navi Mumbai.



History of National Conferences (now DERMACON)

The National Conference of IADVL started in 1947, which is a long time ago & hence the compilation here is largely information collected from seniors whom we gratefully acknowledge.

Dr. U B Narayanan Rao, a pioneer in the speciality, conceived the creation of an all India association of dermatologists & venereologists, & invited Indian physicians practicing this speciality. The idea was widely welcomed & in order to achieve its objectives, they undertook to hold an All India Conference of Dermatologists & Venereologists, on December 27 & 28, 1947, at J J Hospital, Bombay. December 28, 1947 became a landmark in the history of Dermatology with the passing of a resolution to form a framework for the All India Association of Dermatologists & Venereologists (IADV).

- National Conferences were also held in 1965 at Bangalore, 1969 at Hyderabad, 20 August 1972 at Calcutta. Between 1956 to 1973, the conferences were held along with Association of Physicians of India (API) as an annual fixture. Although IADVL was formalised in 1973, its conferences continued to be held with those of the API.
- Absolute separation from API conferences occurred only in 1975, when Dr. B M Ambadi organised at Trivandrum. He
 arranged for a grand first independent conference of IADVL & threw a memorable gala party at his residence.
 Thereafter the National Conference was organized once a year under the auspices of the IADVL. The venue of the
 conference was traditionally selected by a vote of the General Body.
- 1st National Conference of India 1973: the first dermatologist from India, Dr. B N Banerjee (India's Father of Modern Dermatology), was unanimously elected as the First President of IADVL, & Dr. L K Bhutani was designated as the First Hon' General Secretary of the association.
- 4th National Conference of IADVL 1976: the first Ambady Oration was held & was awarded to Dr. V Ramalingaswamy, AIIMS.

• 9th National Conference 1981: for the first time the Presidential Gold Plated pendant & collar was prepared for the President. The draft Constitution of IADVL prepared by Dr. A Krishna was presented in this conference for consideration & approval by the members.

- 11th National Conference 1983: The Constitution of IADVL was adopted.
- 17th National Conference 1989: first Directory of Members of IADVL with their addresses & telephone number, prepared by Dr. B C Kamdar, was released.
- 18th National Conference 1990: IADVL Fellowship programs were first introduced.
- 22nd National Conference 1994: was hosted together with 7th International Congress of Dermatology.
- 25th National Conference 1997: all past Presidents were commemorated with a traditional cap & shawl of Assam during the Silver Jubilee celebrations. Overseas delegates from 7 countries participated.

• 28th DERMAVISION 2000: set a benchmark for all future conferences. During the inaugural function all past Presidents & Hon' General Secretaries were felicitated for their contributions to IADVL. First time ever multiple AC halls ever erected which facilitated parallel scientific sessions. Scientific program was finalised 6 months prior to the conference & scientific program booklets were posted to all registered delegates. Dr. J S Pasricha was honoured with 'Dermatologist of the Millennium'. The first bar coded delegate badges were issued which gave access to all scientific halls & doubled up as food coupons.

CHAPTER 12

IADVL Orations, Awards and Medals

IADVL awards, medals and orations have been the highest honours given by the association to its members in recognition of their contributions per excellence in the field of Dermatology, Venereology and Leprology. These acknowledgements have been an invaluable instrument in attracting innovative and ground breaking works and has led to the incredible growth and development of the speciality. Since the advent of IADVL in 1973 at the National Conference, Udaipur, 2 pharmaceutical companies M/s Glaxo Pharma (!970) and M/s Fulford(India) Ltd (1985) had offered to award a cheque of Rs. 10, 000/-, a Memento and a Certificate to the Orator. Since then the number of awards/prizes and medals has been steadily increasing. In 1990, a committee was formed during the National Conference held in Jaipur under the chairmanship of the then President, IADVL, Dr K Siddappa to frame concrete rules, regulations and criteria for instituting and awarding these orations, prizes and medals. These have been revised from time to time.

ORATIONS:

1. Dr. B. M. Ambady, Oration:

The most prestigious B.M Ambady oration was started by the wife of Late Dr. Bhaskar Menon Ambady and is awarded to any person who has done significant and commendable work in the field of Dermatology, Venereology and Leprology that must have been published in any indexed journal of our specialty. Dr. B.M. Ambady was born on 28th December 1912. After passing M.B.B.S., he joined Rangoon Medical College and then the Indian Army. He joined the Military Hospital, Coimbatore in 1943 as a specialist in Dermatology and Venereology. In 1949, he went for a higher training to USA and UK and got MAPHA and MAAMS. He was the first Head of Department of Dermatology at Trivandrum Medical College, Kerala in 1954. Dr. Ambady passed away in September 1975 from a short fatal illness. A proud soldier all his life "he died boots on". The first independent conference of the association was held in 1975 at Trivandrum under his chairmanship. The first Ambady oration was delivered in Feb 1976 at IADVL conference, New Delhi. The speaker was Dr. V Ramalingaswamy from AIIMS. This oration carries a prize, memento and a certificate.

Description Of The Various Awards:

Awards Given By IADVL During Dermacon (by Application or Nomination)



(1) Professor K. C. Kandhari Foundation Award:

This is the highest award of the Association. It was instituted by Prof. K. C. Kandhari Foundation. This award was started in 1998 in memory of the late Prof. Dr. K. C. Kandhari, who was the first Prof. and Head, Dept. of Dermatology & STDs, All India Institute of Medical Sciences, New Delhi. The amount for this award was donated by Late Prof. K. C. Kandhari Foundation. This award carries a cash prize, certificate and a memento. It is given every year at the National Conference of IADVL to a personality for his/ her lifetime meritorious service or contribution to Dermatology, Venereology or Leprology that has brought prestige to the specialty by teaching, research or patient care. Castellani Reiss Medal was conferred on Dr. K. C. Kandhari by the President of the International Society of Dermatology, Sigfrid Muller in 1994, for lifetime of service to Dermatology at the VII International Congress of Dermatology, New Delhi, India Feb 26 to March 2, 1994. Dr. Kandhari is the only Asian to have received this award till date.

This award is given every year at DERMACON to a personality for lifetime meritorious service or contribution to Dermatology, Venereology, and Leprology by teaching, research or patient care. The candidate for the award is usually nominated by an expert team comprising of the President, Immediate Past President, President Elect and Chairperson of IADVL Academy of Dermatology and ratified by the Central Supervisory Committee.

(3) Dr. J. C. Shroff Memorial Award:

This award is given in memory of the late Dr. J. C. Shroff who was the Hon. Prof. and Head, Dept. of Dermatology and Venereology, Grant Medical College and Sir J. J. Group of Hospitals, Mumbai. Dr. J. C. SHROFF retired from the* Grant Medical College and J. J. Hospital, Mumbai in 1973 after 28 years of service. He was a Past President of IADV. Dr. Shroff was humane, deeply spiritual, a philanthropist and visionary.

This award carries a medal, certificate, and cash prize. It is awarded to any Dermatologist, Venereologist or Leprologist who is above the age of 58 years and who will share his or her lifetime experience, which will be of benefit to our members.

(4) Prof. Ratan Singh Award:

Prof. Ratan Singh Award for meritorious service to the Speciality of Dermatology, Venereology and Leprology. Professor Ratan Singh was the Professor and Head of Department of Dermatology for over 12 years between 1968 and 1981. The award comprises cash and a certificate is given during DERMACON.

This award was started in the year 2007 by IADVL and is given to a Dermatologist for giving meritorious services to the speciality in Dermatology, Venereology and Leprology by teaching/research/patient care/ dedicated service to the National Body of IADVL.

(5) Prof. L. K. Bhutani Award:

Dr. Lalit K. Bhutani was an internationally acclaimed Dermatologist & Venereologist. His fields of interest were STDs including HIV/AIDS, Leprosy, Dermatopathology and Photobiology and was the first to describe the condition Lichen Planus Pigmentosus. In AIIMS, New Delhi, he was the HOD (1979) and eventually the Dean and Director . He was awarded Honorary Fellowship of Royal College of Physicians (Edinburgh) in 1987 and was a recipient of the prestigious BC Roy Award. He published Colour Atlas of Dermatology and Atlas of Sexually Transmitted Diseases. The award is given for achievement in teaching and research in the specialty.

(6) Prof. V. N. Sehgal Award:

Dr. V. N. Sehgal served as Professor or Director Professor for 25 years at various institutes across India. A prolific contributor to dermatologic literature (national and international), he has been on the editorial board of many journals and has been recipient of prestigious awards like Dr. B.C. Roy National Award. This award was started in 2008 and is given for accomplishing excellence in Dermatology.

(7) Prof. Ganapati Panja Memorial Award:

Late Dr. Ganapati Panja was a pioneer who established the Dept. of Dermatology in School of Tropical Medicine (1923). He received Rockefeller Fellowship (1932) and was trained in London and Edinburgh. In STM, he classified the genus Malassezia (1927), proposed a new oil medium for their enhancement and growth (1941). He was the first Editor of Indian Journal of Dermatology in 1955. This award was started in 2010 and given on IADVL Day to a senior dermatologist for excellence in the field of Clinical Dermatology or Dermatopathology.

(8) Dr. L. N. Sinha Memorial Award:

This award was started in 2005 in the memory of Late Dr. L N Sinha, Professor of Dermatology, Magadh Medical College, Gaya, Bihar. The award is rotated on a zonal basis. It is donated by IADVL, Bihar and Jharkhand State Branch. It is given to a member below 45 years for overall contribution to the specialty (and not only for scientific achievement).

(9) Prof. G. Senthalmil Selvi Award:

Dr. G. Senthamil Selvi was the Professor of Dermatology, Madras Medical College, Chennai and spearheaded the Mycology Section of the Department of Dermatology and known for her immense contribution in Dermatomycology. The award was started in 2010, is given by President on IADVL Day for the best published work in mycology.

(10) Prof. S. Premalatha Award:

Dr. S Premalatha was a senior Professor of Dermatology having served in Madras Medical College, and institutions like Shri Ramachandra Medical College and Research Institute, Chennai. She is known for her works in Cutaneous Leishmaniasis, Palmar Dermatoglyphics in Genodermatoses, and Finger Printing Technique. This award is given for the 'Best Research Project' in Dermatology.

(11) Dr. B. V Satyanarayana Memorial Award:

This award is given during DERMACON to IADVL member for best thesis.



(12) The Best Teacher Award:

Every year a best teacher award will be given to one member from each zone and the AFDG, either by application or nomination. It will be announced along with other awards by the Hon. Secretary General. Teaching experience (UG, PG, Fellowship, PhD), Number of books written, Number of Publications, Number of presentations, Number of academic meetings organised, Number of students guided for PG/ Fellowship/ PhD, additional academic qualifications and other achievements are taken into consideration during selection

(13) Dermaseva Award:

This award was instituted to reward innovative community projects from IADVL members and IADVL State Branches which offer benefits to patients / people with respect to dermatological diseases.

(14) IADVL DERMA PRACTICE AWARD:

It will be awarded on IADVL DAY either by application or nomination to a life member who has been in full time practice with no teaching in medical college for at least 10 years. These awards will be decided by a committee of five people comprising of IADVL President, Immediate Past President, President-Elect, Hon. Secretary General IADVL and Chairperson IADVL Practice Management cell. The award shall be in the form of a citation and a plaque in appreciation of their contribution.

(15) Dr. Leslie Marquis Award:

Dr. Leslie Marquis was Past President, IADVL, Professor Emeritus (T. N. Medical College and B. Y. L. Nair Hospital, Mumbai) and Head of Dermatology (St. Georges Hospital and B. Nanavati Hospital). This award is given to a guest speaker for the best scientific talk at DERMACON.

(16) M. G. M. Medical College Prize:

This unique was started out of the contribution given by the organizers of DERMACON, Indore in 1981 and carries a certificate and cash prize. It is given to a member below the age of 35 years for the best paper presented in the award paper session.

(17) Prof. H. C. Mohanty Award:

Prof. H. C. Mohanty was the retired Prof. Emeritus and Head of Dept. of Dermatology and Venereology, SCB Medical College, Cuttack. This award is given at DERMACON for the best paper on Leprosy presented during the conference.

(18) Dr. F. Handa Award:

Dr.F Handa was the Prof. and Head, Dept. of Dermatology and Venereology, Medical College, Patiala and the Past President of IADVL. Started in 1980, it is given to a member aged below 35 years for the best paper presented during the award paper session during DERMACON

(19) Prof. B. N. Banerjee Award:

Dr B.N. Banerjee was the First President of the present day IADVL. He was Professor of Medicine at Medical College, Kolkata, after passing his M.R.C.P. in England in 1956. He started the Diploma in Dermatology Course (1959) from which D.D.V. Course was born. He was the key person for amalgamation of the two Dermatological and Venereological Societies into one i.e. IADV&L. This award carries a gold plated medal, a certificate and cash prize. It is given to an member below 35 years for the best original research paper, either presented in the award session during DERMACON or published in the IJDVL.

(20) Dr. B. B. Gokhale Medal:

Dr. Gokhale was Prof. and Head, Dept of Dermatology and Venereology, B. J. Medical College and Sassoon Hospital, Pune. Started in 1985 and given to a member below 35 years of age for the best paper presented in the award paper session during DERMACON.

(21) Prof. K. Siddappa Medal:

Dr. K. Siddappa was the retired Prof. and Head, Dept. of Skin & S.T.D., J.J.M. Medical College, Davangere, Karnataka who was also a Past President of the IADVL and one of the initiators of the IADVL Text Book project. This award is given to a postgraduate for the best paper (preference to original research paper) presented in the award paper session during DERMACON.

(22) Prof. D. K. Gupta Medal:

Dr. D. K. Gupta was the retired Prof. Emeritus and Head, Dept. of Dermatology, Medical College, Jabalpur and Past President of the IADVL. This award is given to a female postgraduate IADVLite for the best paper (preference to original research) presented in the award paper session.

(23) Dr. Manu Patel Memorial Prize:

Dr. Manu Patel was attached as Honorary Dermatologist to various hospitals at Bombay. The award carries a certificate and cash prize and is given to an IADVL member for the best poster presentation at DERMACON.

(24) Dr. Bishnupriya Devi Award:

Dr. Bishnupriya Debi was the Professor and Head, S. C. B. Medical College of Cuttack from the year 1990. The award is given to the first author of the best paper published in the IJDVL.

(25) Mrs. Indubala Memorial Award:

This award was instituted by Past President of IADVL, Dr. Kalyan Banerjee, from West Bengal, in memory of his mother, Smt. Indubala Devi. It is given for the best paper published on the subject of Industrial contact dermatitis (or, on contact dermatitis) in the IJDVL.

(26) Dr. C.S. Bhavani Kumar Memorial Award:

Late Dr. C. S. Bhavani Kumar was a senior dermatologist in Hyderabad. This award was started from 2006 and is given for the best paper presented on Dermatological surgery during DERMACON.





- Three PG Thesis Awards: 3 numbers of PG Thesis Awards are given during the National Conferences (DERMACON AND MIDDERMACON) following selection by IADVL ACADEMY.
- IADVL Abbott Researcher Awards: Two awards are given after evaluation by the IADVL Academy, one to member above 35 years of age and one below 35 years of age for published original research papers in Dermatology, Venereology and Leprosy during the year.
- IADVL-National Post Graduate Quiz Program Award: This is awarded to the winner of the prestigious IADVL quiz for the nationwide postgraduates in Dermatology. The finals of IADVL-Pharma National Quiz Program should be held during DERMACON every year. Four teams from each zone are selected for the finals by conducting a zonal quiz program earlier.
- Best Branch Award: The award carries a certificate and a memento given by IADVL every year to
 a branch of IADVL judged by a panel consisting of the two immediate past and present Hon.
 Secretary Generals. Two best branch awards each year- one to a large branch and one to a small
 branch.
- Special Awards for Best State performance in each category
 - a. State performing the best Community Activity
 - b. State performing the best in E-voting
 - c. State performing the best in PLM conversion
 - d. State with best Internal Administration
- IADVL President Appreciation Award: EC can give up to five appreciation awards to the members who have rendered exceptional services, for the betterment of IADVL. Members of committees shall be eligible. This award will be given during IADVL Day.
- AWARDS to IADVL Observership awardees: Every year 2 awards are given to observership awardees (1) Smt. Mayadevi Observership to the highest scorer in Dermatosurgery. (2) Dr. P B Haribhakti Observership to the highest scorer in Dermatopathology.


CHAPTER 13

IADVL Textbook of Dermatology and Journals

IADVLTextbook

During the tenure of Dr. K Siddappa as the President of the Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (IADVL), Prof. R.G. Valia and Prof. Leslie Marquis suggested that the association publish a postgraduate textbook of dermatology, one with primarily an Indian and Third World audience in mind. It was envisaged that, unlike other textbooks, the IADVL textbook would comprehensively deal with Sexually Transmitted Diseases and Leprosy as well. Considering that the presentation of these disorders some-what differs from that in white skin, it was also decided to incorporate a colour atlas. The textbook project took the shape of a national project with the participation of senior academicians from all over India. The first edition of IADVL textbook of Dermatology was published in 1994. It had 2 volumes, 1437 pages and 1123 illustrations.

Dr. R G Valia was the chief editor and Dr. Ameet Valia the assistant editor.





Second Edition - Volume 1

Keeping in view the scientific developments in these specialty subjects, the second edition of the textbook was completely updated and some new chapters on cutaneous surgery and AIDS were added. Second edition was published in 2001 with 2 volumes, 1918 pages, and 1243 illustrations.




Third Edition - Volume 1

The third edition was published in 2008, had 2 volumes, 2154 pages and 1640 illustrations. New chapters such as nail surgery, anti-aging procedures, chemical peels and lasers were added.



Fourth Edition – Volume 1

The editorial team changed for 4 th edition. It was published in 2015, had 3 volumes, 3316 pages and 2342 illustrations.



The 5th edition was published in 2022, has 3 volumes, 4070 pages and 2417 illustrations.

This edition comprised of 20 sections, and each section has a section editor. There was a separate section on what's new in Dermatology, Dermatosurgery and Cosmetology. More than 15 new chapters like History of Indian Dermatology, neonatal skin care, and diet in dermatology were added. Each chapter was elaborated with key messages, schematics, flowcharts, tables and text boxes for easy reference.

The editorial team consisted of Dr. S Sacchidanand – Chief editor and Dr. Arun Inamadar and Dr. Chetan Oberoi as Co editors.



The fifth edition editorial team was headed by Dr. S Sacchidanand, chief editor and Dr. Savitha, Shilpa and Dr. Shashikumar B M as Co editors.

155 chapters in 25 sections, each chapter has been updated with the addition of dermoscopy details. Separate section on hair and nail disorders and practice management was added. Newer topics like pharmacogenomics, innovations and sclerotherapy in dermatology were also included in this edition.

Indian Journal of Dermatology, Venereology and Leprology (IJDVL) – Scaling new heights

The history of the Indian Journal of Dermatology, Venereology and Leprology (IJDVL) may be traced back to 1935 when a journal named as the Indian Journal of Venereal Diseases was first published and edited by the pioneering dermatologist, Dr. UB Narayan Rao, in his personal capacity, from Bombay (now Mumbai).

He changed the name of the journal to Indian Journal of Venereal Diseases and Dermatology in 1941. After running the journal successfully for two decades, he handed it over to the newly formed association of dermatologists and venereologists (The Indian Association of Dermatologists & Venereologists, IADV) and the journal was again renamed as the Indian Journal of Dermatology and Venereology from 1956, yet Dr Rao remained the managing editor till his death in 1960. The journal continued to be compiled and edited in Mumbai by Dr. SC Desai and Dr. J. Fernandez, though from 1956 to 1960 Dr. RV Rajam from Madras (now Chennai) and Dr. G. Panja from Calcutta (now Kolkata) were the Chief Editors of Venereology and Dermatology Sections, respectively.

Dr. TK Mehta looked after the journal from 1960 to 1971 as the Chief Editor while Dr. Bhaktaviziam handled the responsibility and role Chief Editor from 1972 to 1977. In 1976, the name of the journal was changed to the current title viz. Indian Journal of Dermatology, Venereology and Leprology. Table 1 chronologically enlists all the Chief Editors till the present one.

The journal always printed a few pages in colour and the quality kept improving over the years. Dr. Pasricha initiated attractive colour photo-features that evoked interest while Dr. Pavithran started the practice of printing colour photographs with the articles.

From 2003, the journal went digital and developed website for publishing articles online and also required authors to submit articles in digital form. From this year, the journal was printed on matte finish, art paper in colour, without any extra charge to authors and also got indexation with PubMed from 2004 and with Science Citation Index Expanded from 2007 besides other important databases, thus attracting good articles. This also made the journal economically independent.

The impact factor of the journal showed a rising trend from 2005 onwards. IJDVL got the first official journal impact factor (JIF) in 2009 (0.976) and crossed the critical number of 1 in 2012. It breached the level of 2 in 2017 and the very next year, crossed the level of 3 to scale the heights (JIF - 3.003) which no other Indian journal has ever reached.

Currently, the IJDVL has an impact factor of 2.545, that matches many international journals of dermatology. The journal hindex has trebled in the last 10 years (from 15 in 2011 to 45 in 2021). Since 2017, as per JIF, IJDVL is the highest ranked scholarly journal in India across all disciplines (biomedical and health sciences, physical sciences and mathematics, technology and engineering, social sciences and the arts and humanities).

Due to the expanding multifaceted responsibilities for the Chief Editor and to smoothen the transition blues, from 2008 the IADVL started selecting the IJDVL Editor one year before the actual take over. This allowed the incoming Editor adequate time to get used to the functioning of the journal and its websites and to build his/her team.

The IJDVL has kept up pace with many improvements and innovations like e-publications, adding digital object identifiers to articles, publishing articles ahead of print, setting new standards in image reproduction (as images are part of critical evidence in clinical dermatology), having a world class, user-friendly manuscript management system, and last but not least, creating the infrastructure and the methodology for a uniquely robust, multi-tiered editorial review process manned by a huge, distinguished editorial team full of integrity and enthusiasm.



Editorial team

Since going digital in 2003, the IJDVL has maintained completely free open access policy for all viewers and authors. Consequently, the number of page views of the journal website exceed one million per year. The IADVL, thus, contributes to the knowledge pool and educational access to students as well as the general public all over the world. IJDVL marches ahead as a rare peer-reviewed dermatology journal that allows platinum-grade free open access to all.



Indian Dermatology Online Journal (IDOJ)

IDOJ is the first online Journal launched by IADVL in 2010 with Dr. Shyam Verma as founder editor (2010-2015).

This journal was a brainchild of Late Prof. T.G. Gopinathan, former Professor and Head of the department of Dermatology and Venereology, Government Medical College, Calicut, Kerala, India. IDOJ was started with the aim to encourage writing and publishing among dermatologists and to showcase clinical dermatology in India. This fledgling journal is steadily growing in its stature, content and readership receiving manuscripts submission across the globe. Later, Dr. Sunil Dogra took over as editor (2016-2021).

Dr. KT Ashique has been rendering credible services as associate editor to journal since its inception. IDOJ now boast to be one among the top dermatology journals having shortest manuscript turnaround time and time to publication from acceptance. IDOJ by virtue of being a print journal since January 2018, indexed in DOAJ and in UGC-CARE list; authors are eligible to get their publications credit for teaching faculty appointment/promotion as per norms in India.



It is a bimonthly open-access journal indexed in PubMed Central (PMC). As important milestones, IDOJ got indexed in ESCI (Emerging Sources Citation Index by Clarivate Analytics) in April 2021 and was accepted for inclusion in Scopus, including listing under Scimago Dermatology Journals and Web of Science in December 2021. Journal issues as complimentary copies are posted to all the corresponding authors, state and national IADVL office bearers and medical colleges libraries in the country courtesy of IADVL.

> associations are either overspending or underspending on their website without a definite goal. But, when it comes to the website of the Indian



The Early Years: Budding of the Website

2001

- National IADVL website was created by Dr. Kuriyipe, Dr. PV Mathew and Dr. S. Criton as the prelude to the 30th National Conference of IADVL held at Kochi
- Essentially made for the facilitation of the conference
- · Contained a lot of preliminary information about IADVL
- Post-conference, the website was retained

2004

- The first independent website of IADVL (www.iadvl.com) under the guidance of Dr. K K Rajababu and Dr. A K Bajaj with the help of the Editor of the Indian Journal of Dermatology, Venereology and Leprology (IJDVL), Dr. Uday Khopkar, the then Honorary General Secretary, Dr S. Sacchidanand and the National Executive body was launched.
- It was strengthened with lots of additional information and features
- The website was simple in design and content
- Procter & Gamble sponsored the creating and maintenance of the IADVL & IJDVL website
- Dr. VP Kuriyipe, who headed the National Executive then, embarked upon an ambitious project of purchasing one laptop for every dermatologist in the country



- Around 400 dermatologists purchased one to become tech savvy and be a part of the digital world
- All the members were sensitised about the platform and the website hits started increasing

2005

In the Midterm Central Council Meeting in Hyderabad, Dr. S. Criton and Dr. Koushik Lahiri presented the proposals for a comprehensive and full-fledged website for IADVL

Dr. Koushik Lahiri put forward a detailed proposal related to introducing e-governance in IADVL which was passed unanimously

Inputs came to include features like E-mail IDs for executives, Newsletters, Online Search Directory, Online Payment of Fees, and OnlineVoting

By the end of the year, the website became more interactive and informative

2006

On 4th February under the leadership of the President, Dr. Suresh Joshipura and the then Honorary General Secretary Dr. Koushik Lahiri, a full-fledged IADVL-Website committee was formed

On 6th August the new website (www.iadvl.org) was launched in Hyderabad with features like

- Information about IADVL and its branches.
- Details about the forthcoming conferences, and workshops.
- Information about all awards, prizes and scholarships etc.
- Online IADVL Directory
- IADVL Constitution and all the IADVL Newsletters.
- Online updating of Member's address. The IADVL Secretariat and the Editor, IJDVL get the information instantly

This website revolutionized the administrative works of the association and ushered in e-governance in the works of IADVL

2008

- Plan was made to make the IADVL website more user friendly
- All the State Branch Websites should have links to the national IADVL website
- Member updation of databases was strongly encouraged through website or mail

2009

- The idea of not using the IADVL or any connected platform like IJDVL, publications, branch websites, IADVL egroups etc. for any candidate's favour was reinforced
- Institutional teachers and students sensitized to make avail of the IADVL website frequently
- The process to log-in, how to find a dermatologist and how to search content on the website was shared with members

2010-11

- The need for a dedicated drive to create IADVL Directory and boost web literacy was discussed
- The website got revamped and hosted by IADVL itself
- Digital Lecture Series got featured in website

2012-13

- Concern was raised to stop the printing of newsletter and use only the website for its access: following this, IADVL News Bulletin was made available digitally in website for download: election notification and oration announcements included
- Proposal was accepted to have a dedicated web page of the IADVL Academy with space/links for SIGs

2014-15

- A new vibrant and exquisite look was given to the website with many new features. Details like online registration for E-voting and enrolment for IADVL trust were put up in website
- Separate tabs like "IADVL Academy", "Post graduates", "Patients and Public", "Practice Management" were added. IADVL "RESI-DREAM" newsletter created by IADVL provisional life members was started to promote first-time writers and boost interaction with senior members. It included quizzes, thought pages and interaction pages with website linkage. This was added to the website

The initial journey has been great to make sure the foundation is strong to build the new age website in the coming era. Let's have a look at the recent developments too

2016-17

- The Website was revamped with all major processes like New Membership Registration, PLM to LM conversion, Address change, Information on upcoming events, applications for Scholarships, Awards, Orations Fellowships, Workshops etc. were made available
- Complete e-membership and e-payment platform (OMAS- Online Membership Application System) was made available in 2016. This enabled online membership application with automated confirmation mail, application status tracking and generation of membership ID
- Addition of the IADVL Taskforce against Topical Steroid Abuse (ITATSA) as a tab on the website
- IADVL DermApp, was available for download from the website
- A safe, secure and dynamic voting system was generated by the website team. The plan was to introduce e-voting and transfer existing voters to the online database
- Live database, Membership Profile Data Management System (MPDMS) integrated into the website in 2017
- Request to register for e-voting on the website and app started as by 2018, the voting would be totally online
- Mass email and SMS campaigns were conducted to motivate members to sign up at www.iadvl.org and update the database



2018-19

- Fully functional e-voting system with a live database and contestant's summary in 2018
- Member benefits on signing up with the website included access E-certificates and Membership ID card, access to IADVL DermaApp, Access to IADVL Academy (Grants, Observerships, Scholarships, Elibrary, Digital Lecture Series, Dermagyan and Webcasts), Access to IDOJ and IJDVL, Access to Newsletters (IADVL News, IADVL Derma Academia, Derma Practice, IADVL Derma Talent, SIG Newsletters, Residream), Access to IADVL Member's Directory, Refer patients Connect & Collaborate, Manage individual's profile with features to update profile picture, personal details and achievements
- Redesigning of website with the theme of "Peacock blue colour" was done in 2019
- Introduction of "find a dermatologist" feature for general public pan India and get quality treatment from qualified dermatologists
- Life members who register online at IADVL website should automatically be taken as e voter instead of being asked again to register as e voters

2020-21

- The online platform boosted the number of e-voters and streamlined the process of voting with a reduction of the voting period to 6 weeks
- Drive for the conversion of PLM to LM through the OMAS on the IADVL website
- Corrections of MPDMS done with data of many members with missing details. Also it was updated with email IDs and phone numbers of members
- COVID registry available on the website in keeping with the pandemic and its varied dermatological manifestations on the Indian population
- Separate sections for the public as well as members were created on the website
- All the online academic activities were archived and made accessible to all IADVL members in the video gallery section. The public health videos are available for the general public as well.
- The latest updated constitution was uploaded on the website



2022

- IADVL Golden Jubilee logo finds its place on the website to mark the gallant 50th Year of IADVL
- IADVL Golden Jubilee Videos named "IADVL UTSAV" have been incorporated
- IADVL Golden Jubilee podcasts and new presidential initiatives were added



The IADVL website has been one of the most dynamic components of the Association. The journey illustrated above not only speaks of the evolution in terms of looks but also in including every new change in the activity and structure of the Association. A prolific team with cutting edge technology backs up the website to make it more user friendly, responsive and customised to match the needs of the members as well as the public. IADVL & International Societies Collaboration



The Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (IADVL) is now emerging as a global authority especially in dermatoses regarding dark skinned patients. With its 14000 plus members, IADVL has grown from strength to strength making it the second largest dermatologic association in the world after the American Academy of Dermatology (AAD). IADVL has steadily made its mark on the international platform initially via Indian dermatologists on an individual basis and later by initiation of various activities like scholarships, travel grants, workshops and sister society sessions at international conferences like World Congress of Dermatology (WCD), American Academy of Dermatology, European Association of Dermatology and Venereology (EADV), and International Society of Dermatology.

History and Evolution

Before the inception of the IADVL, Chennai hosted the first Asian Congress of Dermatology in 1970 with the presence of the famous Japanese Dermatologists Dr. Ota and Dr. Ito. The first international interaction of the IADVL was in the year 1976 with the International Society of Tropical Dermatology via an International conference with the theme of Pigmentary dermatoses. Dr. PN Behl and Dr. LK Bhutani were its organizing president and secretary respectively.

In the beginning interaction with international colleagues took place on an individual level and brought faculty from around the globe to our conferences. This would change in the year 1994-95 when IADVL became a member of the International League of Dermatological Societies (ILDS) under the presidential tenure of Dr. R P Okhandiar and Dr. Dinesh Mathur as Secretary general. Dr. Kalyan Banerjee for the first time attended the ILDS delegate meeting at WCD held at Sydney in 1997. The ILDS membership was renewed in 2006 during the presidential tenure of Dr. Suresh Joshipura and Dr. Koushik Lahiri as the General secretary.

At WCD, Argentina 2007, Dr. Chetan Oberoi, the then President of IADVL became the first Indian to be elected as the Regional Director of ILDS, in charge of Asia and Africa. He was also instrumental in securing scholarships for more than 40 young IADVL members for attending the WCD. He is also an Honorary Member of the Italian Society of Dermatologists.

The South Asian Regional Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (SARAD) provided an opportunity to interact with dermatologists from neighbouring South Asian countries.



The first independent International conference hosted by the IADVL was SARCD 2015 (9th Conference of South Asian Regional Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists) at Mysuru, Karnataka

The first Indians to be at the helm of SARAD were Dr. K K Raja Babu as the President and Dr. S Sacchidanand as the Secretary of the association. The executive members from India included Dr. A K Bajaj, Dr. Suresh P Joshipura, Dr. P V Kuriyipe, Dr. Vijay Garg and Dr. V K Upadhyaya in 2005. In 2015, Dr. S.Sacchidanand became the President and Dr. Jayadev Betkerur became the Secretary.

The International Society of Dermatology (ISD) nominated Prof. VN Sehgal onto the board of directors (2004-2009). He also served as a member of the editorial board of International Journal of Dermatology. Dr. Rekha Seth served as the Vice President of ISD in the year 2009. In 2009, Dr. Shyam Verma was nominated onto the board of directors. Subsequently, he has been its Vice President from 2013-17 and 2021 -25 and Director from 2017-21. He was elected as International Board member of European Academy of Dermatology and Venereology (EADV) from 2018-2021 and has been re-elected to serve from 2022-2025.

CHAPTER 16

Practice of Dermatosurgery & Cosmetic Dermatology in India

Introduction:

Not far into the past, Dermatology was an orphan branch of Medicine. It wasn't in demand, both among doctors and the public. This was largely due to limited therapeutic options available and also, due to societal moralistic attitude toward beauty, in which the emphasis was largely on so-called inner beauty while ignoring physical beauty. As the world entered the era of prosperity and globalization, there was an attitude change toward physical beauty. There was an acknowledgment that enhancement of appearance improves social wellbeing and the quality of life. The World Health Organization defines health not merely as an absence of disease and infirmity, but as a positive state of physical, mental, and social wellbeing. The procedural part of Dermatology adds significantly to the well-being of people by enhancing the beauty when it is inherently missing, or restoring it when it is lost due to inflammation, disease or aging. The evolution of Procedural Dermatology and overall therapeutic advancement in Dermatology has made Dermatology the #1 specialty around the world, as suggested by Medscape survey of physicians.

During the past half a century, Dermatology has been transformed from a primarily medical branch into a medical and surgical branch. Dermatosurgery, or its newer version, procedural dermatology, aims to repair and/or improve skin function and cosmetic appearance. It is done either through primarily surgical skills acquired through intensive training, or a skill supplemented through machines (partially automated, lasers, light sources, and energy-based devices). Dermatology has the largest number of lasers, light sources and energy-based devices for any specialty.

IADVL and its sister associations, such as Association of Cutaneous Surgeons (I), Cosmetic Dermatology Society of India, Pigmentary Dermatology Society of India, and Nail Society of India have been actively contributing to training and research in the field of Procedural Dermatology.


History of Dermatosurgery in India

In the last century, procedural dermatology was in its infancy, restricted to chemical cautery and paring of warts. Electrocautery and cryotherapy with CO₂ ice was becoming popular for treating warts. Localized stable patches of vitiligo were treated with camouflage tattooing but the results were not aesthetically pleasant. Dr. P. N. Behl, one of the senior dermatologists, had introduced dermatosurgery in India for the first time in early 1960s, with his pioneer work in vitiligo – thin Thiersch Split thickness skin graft, dermabrasion for small pox scars and other conditions including prophylactic dermabrasion for xeroderma pigmentosa, etc. He was the first person to carry out hair transplant through punch grafting. Thus, he was the true father of dermatosurgery in India. He also established Behl's Skin Institute where he trained many young dermatologists. The first dermatosurgery workshop at National level was conducted in November 1995 at Nanavati hospital under the guidance of Dr. Satish S. Savant and his faculty team members Dr. Vinay Saraf, Dr. Marwah, Dr. Gala, Dr. Kalpana and Dr. Mehta. It received an overwhelming response and was attended by 400 + dermatologists from all over India. During this workshop, various surgical procedures such as tattooing, miniature punch grafting, pinch grafting, nail surgery, chemical peeling, dermabrasion, etc., were demonstrated. It was here that Dr. C.R. Srinivas from Manipal, and Dr. Satish Savant along with his team came up with an idea of forming an Association. Soon after, this idea was materialised in Manipal and an Association of Dermatologic Surgeons of India (ADSI) came into existence with Dr. C.R. Srinivas as Vice President and Dr. Satish Savant as President. Many Dermatosurgical workshops under the guidance of Dr. Satish Savant, Dr. C.R. Srinivas and Dr. V. P. Kaushik, Dr. Yashwant Tawde, Dr. Parekh, were conducted all over India, Oman Nepal and Pakistan. Many pioneer workers in the field of dermatosurgery and cosmetology contributed to the subject, few of them being Dr. Ganesh Pai, Dr. Gurinderjit Singh, Dr. Kaushal Verma, Dr. D A Satish, Dr. S C Rajendran, Dr. Niti Khunger, Dr. Krupa Shankar, Dr. Srinivas Murthy, Dr. R.R.Chougule, Dr. Bipin Deshpande, Dr. Sharad Mutalik, Dr. Sushil Tahiliani, Dr. Somesh Gupta, Dr. Manas Chatterjee and others. ADSI held its first National Conference at Bangalore in 1997. In the year 1998, Dr. Satish Savant released his first textbook and atlas of Dermatosurgery and cosmetology at National conference of IADVL Chandigarh. This book started the teaching in dermatologic surgery and motivated several dermatologists to take up the knife. The first publication IJDS was published in 1999 under the editorship of the versatile knowledgeable Dr. Mukul Sharma.

The merger in the 2000s

At the same time, people with similar thoughts had formed an association, Indian Academy of Cutaneous Surgeons (IACS) at Kolkata under the able leadership of Dr. Subrata Malakar. Initially, office bearers of both the organizations were unaware of the existence of such two separate associations related to the same super-specialty of dermatology. Ultimately it was mutually decided to merge these two associations into one strong national association, and thus Association of Cutaneous Surgeons of India (ACSI) was established.

ACSI logo was designed by Dr. Satish Savant in 2000. With the advent of the new century, dermatologic surgery advanced by leaps and bounds.



Post the 2010s

The first decade of this century witnessed many new revolutionary techniques including devices and lasers. IADVL SIG Dermatosurgery was established which, with inputs from ACSI, which had become a sister society of the IADVL, conducted several conferences and workshops. The first train the trainer workshop was conducted at Ethicon Institute Mumbai in the first decade of this century for faculty of IADVL and ACSI to hone advanced skills

The driving force behind this progress was Dr. Venkataram Mysore. He gave an altogether new dimension to IADVL SIG Dermatosurgery and its link with ACSI. He motivated dermatosurgeons in the making, stimulated them to innovate and




Fourth Spring meeting of International Society of Dermatologic Surgery in New Delhi 2012

modify existing techniques. His publication of the ACSI textbook of Cutaneous and Aesthetic Surgery changed how Dermatosurgery is taught and practiced in India. Several meetings were conducted with International Societies and sister societies and dermatosurgery conferences invited celebrities from various walks of life

The History of Aesthetic Dermatology in India

The beginning

The era of 'Aesthetic Dermatology' in India as we call it today, started in the early nineties as "Cosmetology" and was largely due to the vision and endeavours made by the late and hugely respected Dr. Rekha Sheth. This was an age when it was largely believed that beauty had no science and was largely scoffed upon by the purist dermatologist. There were a handful of "aesthetic dermatologists" (Dr. Malavika Kohli, Dr. Maya Vedamurthy, Dr. Mukta Sachdev amongst a few others) who contributed to small meetings at simple venues with a minuscule attendance to start with.

The international arena at the time was buzzing with the advent of lasers, cosmetic uses of botulinum toxin and the use of dermal fillers. The late nineties saw the first Diode laser for hair removal and first CO_2 laser for resurfacing in India. Those few who either had the courage or finances or both, invested in the future and started the journey in laser physics. There were limited avenues to access international training and exposure to aesthetics, and it was purely through one's own grit and determination to acquaint oneself with this brand new subject did one start learning and getting acquainted with aesthetic procedures.


Chemical peels was perhaps the first aesthetic procedure performed in a few clinics, where glycolic acid and TCA peels were prepared indigenously via dispensing pharmacies. Microdermabrasion gained huge popularity and came to be known as "skin polishing." Botulinium Toxin A (Botox) made its appearance in 2001 in India. In 2003 Restylane by QMed was brought to India by an enterprising distributor, which a few of us injected with trembling hands in the nasolabial folds.

By now, CSI (Cosmetology Society of India) had taken full form and force and was holding National level conferences to packed halls and Dr. Rekha Sheth was an international faculty as well. Moreover, the pharmaceutical industry and trade were making their contribution to "Cosmetic Dermatology" as it was now called. Many dermatologists practicing purely clinical dermatology started to show interest in cosmetic dermatology and IADVL at this point started including Cosmetic dermatology lectures and workshops as part of the scientific agenda in CME's nationally.

Encouragement came in the way of respected teachers like Dr. Hema Jerajani. Dr. Mukta Sachdev created an international presence and made significant contributions to the growth of the Aesthetic Industry along with Dr. Nina Madnani while erstwhile colleagues like Dr. Ganesh Pai and Dr. Jagdish Sakhiya lent unflinching support.

The rise of a movement

The period of 2000 onward was one, where cosmetic dermatology evolved by leaps and bounds in the IADVL and globally. The seniors mentioned above had beautifully laid down the pillars and a foundation so to say, for future growth and the new breed of dermatologists or the "Gen-Next" who had graduated around this period were lucky enough to see what's going on in the world of cosmetic dermatology, right here in India. While we were still learning from our compatriots

worldwide, we were learning more from each other and our patients. The stage had been set for a bright future. In 2007 a group of like-minded procedural dermatologists, Dr. Malvika Kohli, Dr. Nina Madnani, Dr. Mukta Sachdev and Dr. Maya Vedamurthy came together and started a fellowship program, a first of its kind called the IAAD (Indian Academy of Aesthetic Dermatology) to share knowledge and train youngsters. This was the first effort to start such training sessions in metros and conduct hands-on workshops

While IADVL started paying more attention to the "cosmetic dermatology" section, it was also the decade where IADVL formed its Special Interest Group (SIG) in Lasers and Aesthetics (SIGLA). These SIG's were formed under the aegis of the IADVL Academy which was initially proposed in 2006-2007, and finally came into being under the IADVL presidency of Dr. Sacchidanand in 2008. The SIG's were formed in 2010, however the SIGLA really picked up steam in 2016, under the presidency of Dr. Venkataram Mysore. Certain individuals who have been instrumental in the formative years of SIGLA include Dr. Sanjeev Aurungabadkar, Dr. Shehnaz Arsiwala and Dr. Swapnil Shah, to name a few. The group was formed like many others to teach and impart knowledge to dermatologists across India regarding basic and advanced cosmetic procedures to enhance their practices. The initial group which was formed was to take care of lasers, energy-based devices, and aesthetics, which in time evolved into separate groups (Lasers & energy-based devices and Aesthetics as two separate SIG's) as these branches of dermatology grew and it was only pertinent that both received complete attention. In 2016, SIGLA of the IADVL Academy and IADVL Delhi State Branch (IADVL DSB) conducted the first IADVL SIG 2-day laser conference, at the India Habitat Center, New Delhi which turned out to be a resounding success

This was carried out under the leadership of Dr. Mukesh Girdhar, then IADVL DSB president (2015-16) and Dr. Rajat Kandhari, IADVL DSB Honorary secretary (2015-16). The 12th World Congress of Cosmetic Dermatology was conducted in India in 2017.

From then on IADVL Academy and SIG Lasers and SIG Aesthetics have worked hard to optimize teaching of lasers and aesthetics in not only major cities, but also Tier 2 and Tier 3 cities, done web series and virtual and physical CME's, and formulated consensus guidelines of which particularly worth mentioning are those which came out during the middle of the COVID 19 pandemic which encouraged and provided aesthetic dermatologists a guideline of how to get back into practice in challenging times. Moreover, regular newsletters, physical international speaker programs and video demonstrations were also carried out to encourage, inculcate and impart knowledge to dermatologists throughout India.

In 2022, the Golden Jubilee year of IADVL, first time ever hands on training programs on injectable botulinum toxin and filler workshops are being conducted Pan India, under Presidential project of Dr Rashmi Sarkar, President IADVL 2022.

Looking forward

Today, Indian dermatologists are at the forefront of Aesthetic dermatology globally, and the future appears to be promising. The new image of dermatology which has been shaped by our seniors and mentors must be handled with utmost respect and care and should be taught to the youngsters with humility and imparting ethics. It is the choice of the individual to choose the right mix or just do what one likes. Nothing is right or wrong as long as it is practiced ethically. The secret to being a successful dermatologist in India currently would be to master the art of balancing both.

Rise of Teledermatology Society in India

The Indian Society of Teledermatology (INSTED) was established in year of 2007.

This unique society was started with lot of passion, insight and dedication, which has multiplied manifold and continues till date. In the year 2007, India was projected as the cradle of e-health in Asia. That certainly gives us the edge to form the INSTED and enhance skin heath globally, to make Teledermatology help in the following three ways:

- To the patient, it is almost a home-delivery of health care
- To the referring doctor, it is empowerment of his service
- To the organization, it is efficiency-improvement.

The MISSION AND VISION of INSTED was to utilize modern telecommunication technology to exchange expert medical information in dermatology and allied specialities and to promote the delivery of dermatologic services. It created a platform for direct access of the public to the experts in the field and imparted correct information regarding dermatological diseases to the lay public. No sooner than it was created the INSTED hosted the Second World Congress of Teledermatology in 2008 at in* Chennai. The event was a runaway success with global attraction and recognition.





In 2011, the International League of Dermatologic Societies, at its General Assembly Meeting in Seoul approved and included INSTED as a Sister Society. In the following year, Prof. Jayakar Thomas was elected as the President of the International Society of Teledermatology in 2012 during its Fourth World Congress at Tbilisi, Georgia. The members of INSTED are now invited world over as well as during our Dermacons to deliver lectures. Besides, chapters on Teledermatology found a place in the IADVL Textbook and the ACSI textbook too in all the editions. The IDOJ in its 2013 issue finds an article on the scope of teledermatology in India.

The annual Conference of the INSTED – '**TELEDERM – INDIA**' is often partnered by the Chennai City Chapter of IADVL. The most recent activity has been an interview with Prof. Amanda Oakley, the current President of the International Society of Teledermatology.

This write-up comes on behalf of all the members of INSTED who are very proud of the society and are humbled by the recognition given to them on the occasion of the Golden Jubilee of IADVL.

Pigmentary Disorders Society (PDS)



The Pigmentary Disorders Society (PDS) is the only registered society specifically addressing pigmentary diseases in India. It is dedicated to furthering research and advancements in the field of pigmentary disorders encompassing hyperpigmentation and hypopigmentation disorders, including vitiligo.

It was founded in 2012 by Dr Rashmi Sarkar with Dr Jagdish Sakhia as President, Dr Rashmi Sarkar as Chief Founder and Secretary. Dr Rashmi Sarkar took over as President in 2016.

Dr Narendra Gokhale was Secretary 2016 to 19 and Dr Bhavesh Swarnakar, 2019 onwards.





PDS conducts the Pigmentarycon, a National Level Biennial Conference that is eagerly awaited and extremely wel attended. The first was held in Goa in 2013 and the 5th pigmentarycon was recently held in a hybrid manner in Mumbai from 4th to 6th March 2022.

Pigment International is the official journal of the PDS, focusing on the latest updates and reviews in pigmentarycon diseases. It is being published since 2014, and was online only till 2016. It was made offline since 2017. The number of issues per year has been increased from 2 to 3. It is indexed with DOAJ. Dr. D.M. Thappa was first Editor in Chief (2014-16), followed by Dr. Rashmi Sarkar (2017 - 2020) followed by Dr. M Sendhil Kumaran.

The PDS Academy was envisioned to encourage research work by members and the PDS research grants are highly coveted. In addition, the PDS academy also publishes newletters and patient information booklets. The PDS is also a part of ILDS since 2021. It conducts sister society meetings with ASPCR and Skin of Color Society (SOCS).

Refocusing on Leprosy with Renewed Zeal: An IAL Motto


IAL (Indian Association of Leprologists) as an organization was established in 1950 by the world renowned leprologist Dr. Dharmendra and is the only professional body which represents the leprologists of India, it is not an organization of a specialty but it is an organization of people who are driven by leprosy work and a common dream of Leprosy free world/India. Dr. Dharmendra-was held in very high esteem by the leprosy doctors and was considered a sort of "Oracle" both in matters of medical importance and affairs of the association. He was elected the associations president four times eventually giving up the presidentship to Dr. Wardekar. Dr. RV Wardekar was an influential Indian Leprologist and was instrumental in promoting the active case detection, domiciliary chemotherapy (sulphones) and even prevention (chemoprophylaxis) at a time when the conservatives and some senior leprosy workers



(Gandhian workers) believed that leprosy work only envisaged segregation and care of patients in asylums. He also remained the Director of Gandhi Memorial Leprosy Foundation and various other government bodies for a long time till he took voluntary retirement in 1973. The stalwarts who started and nurtured the association were Dr.

KV Ramanujam, Dr. SK Noordeen, Dr. Charles K Job, Dr. Paul Brand and Noshir Antia, and what began as a small group of individuals which comprised of Leprologists, dermatologists, pathologists, microbiologists, immunologists, plastic surgeons, epidemiologists and social scientists sharing the same vision shaped out to become an independent organization that has over 1000 members at present. Dr. SK Noordeen in one of his presidential addresses once stated "IAL has always been a common forum for a range of leprosy doctors and scientists- from the humble field workers who have seen nothing but Leprosy patients to the top immunologists who have never seen a case of Leprosy." Despite being a professional scientific association the IAL also took along the paramedical workers and social workers involved in leprosy work and in 1969 at the Delhi IAL Conference, a paper "the place of the individual patient in a mass Leprosy Campaign" was presented by a person severely affected by leprosy which shows the open mindedness of the association. The participation and role of dermatologists in IAL increased during the nineties when the central council resolved to include more dermatologists in the association and started a membership drive, emphasizing on the important role of Dermatologists in diagnosis and treatment of Leprosy.

The (IAL) has been more than a professional body and has always maintained a strong interest in the national efforts in the fight against the debilitating hansen's disease. It works closely with Hind Kust Nivaran Sangh (HKNS) and supports HKNS in bringing out the popular and respected Indian Journal of Leprosy (IJL), which is one of the oldest peer reviewed journals of India, dedicated to publishing best research in the areas of leprosy. The IAL Textbook of Leprosy and IAL handbook of Leprosy edited by Prof Bhushan Kumar are other important publications and are read by students and leprosy workers around the world..

The objectives of IAL include:

(a) To promote the research in leprosy, (b) To create public opinion in matters relating to the prevention and cure of leprosy and rehabilitation of patients and (c) To cooperate with the medical and other regional and national institutions having altogether or in part similar objectives. IAL has been working together with the societies of Asia and Latin America where leprosy is of public health importance. With the help of its alliances, it has been able to promote knowledge sharing for all concerned to work toward the goal of 'Zero leprosy' globally.

The recently formed IAL Academy, is the academic and research wing of IAL, which plans academic programmes and research activities to further knowledge and expertise involving its members in the field of leprosy. As an association IAL over these decades has been able to generate awareness regarding the disease in the community as well among health care professionals through CME's, workshops, symposia and webinars. It also promotes clinical, basic and operational research among its members on strategically important gaps in knowledge. The first IAL conference was held in Puri (Orissa) in January 1953 and the main subjects for discussion were Classification of Leprosy, the role of new drug treatments and Control, aspects of pathology and role of BCG vaccination in leprosy control and most of these topics are relevant even today. IAL has come a long

way and is organizing and hosting the International leprosy congress (ILC) in the year 2022 in India. in collaboration with IADVL

IAL was conceived/started in 1949, which was before any organized leprosy programme existed in India and there were some apprehensions that it will also be eliminated or become redundant with elimination of Leprosy, however IAL has grown in stature and importance and is moving forward to work in collaboration with national and international agencies working towards leprosy eradication, and other important issues like vaccines, new management strategies immunotherapy, disability prevention and management.

Nail Society of India (NSI)

The Nail society of India (NSI) came into being by a handful of nail enthusiast in the year 2012. It was the 3rd society in the world dedicated to the very important, humble yet neglected appendage 'nail'. NSI has a vison of encouraging and advancing the current knowledge and practices of nail in health and disease and to promote scientifically rational practice and research in the management of nail diseases including histopathology and surgical procedures. This vison is being accomplished by holding focussed conferences, CME's, training workshops at regular intervals in different parts of the country, by publishing newsletter, monographs, books and other educational material. Another important aspect is to enhance interaction with the international nail specialists.

NSI was registered as National society in May, 2012 with Prof Archana Singal as Founding President (2012-2020), Prof Chander Grover as Honorary Secretory, Prof Vineet Relhan as Treasurer and Dr Soni Nanda as Joint Secretory, executive members from across the country and a star studded International advisory board. From 2021, the reign of NSI is in the able





hands of 2nd President Dr Sushil Tahiliani. The NSI life member list has crossed envious mark of 400 in less than a decade. NSI can boast of holding a very well attended and most eagerly awaited Annual National Conference 'ONYCHOCON' in different states including one international event. 'ONYCHOSCOPE', a Biennial official enewsletter of NSI carries national and international snippets from the world of Nail. NSI has been giving International and National Travel grants for attending annual ONYCHOCONs and International Summit on Nail Diseases (ISND). In 2020, official book 'Textbook of ONYCHOLOGY" was published that emphasize Indian perspective of nail diseases. NSI has started many

academic endeavours like awarding thesis grant to dermatology postgraduates (2018 onwards) to support clinical research and research in the field of nail disorders. The most recent introduction being the 'Best Thesis Award' (2021 onwards) to encourage and support Nail research. Dermatopathology in India

For many years now, dermatology is trending as one of the hot favorites among students appearing in postgraduate medical entrance exams. This is partly because they get lured by the lucrative career opportunities emerging in the field of cosmetic / aesthetic dermatology and dermatosurgery. In contrast, rise of dermatopathology, a joint subspecialty of dermatology and pathology, has shown a slow pace in India. This is because of very few qualified dermatopathologists in India, limited training options in India, lack of interest in dermatopathology among pathologists in general and not a very financially rewarding stream.

Dermatopathology Society of India (DSI) was established as a sister society of the Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (IADVL) in 1997 to disseminate knowledge and promote research in the field of dermatopathology. The society is

expanding ever since, with both dermatologists and pathologists being its members. CME programs and workshops with microscopy sessions are conducted regularly by DSI, in collaboration with IADVL Special Interest Group (SIG) - Dermatopathology, pathology associations like Indian Association of Pathologists and Microbiologists at National, State and Regional levels and International bodies like International Society of Dermatopathology and Asian Society of Dermatopathology. Digital slide format or virtual microscopy is nowadays followed in most of the meetings, allowing a large number of delegates to view and even from remote locations. Focused one-hour sessions on Dermatopathology are being conducted in coordination with members of SIG at DERMACONs and MID-DERMACONs.



Other initiatives taken out by DSI include the Image of the month and Mid-month mindbender, which attract enthusiastic participation from members every month. In 2014, Indian Journal of Dermatopathology and Diagnostic Dermatology was launched as an official publication of DSI and IADVL Karnataka Branch, with Dr Sujay Khandpur as the first editor-in-chief. It is a peerreviewed online journal with semi-annual print on demand compilation of issues published and is the only journal from India dedicated to this sub-speciality. The number of good quality submissions to the journal have gradually increased over the years.

To impart specialized training to those members who wish to pursue Dermatopathology further, IADVL offers observerships currently at Christian Medical College, Vellore and earlier at KEM Hospital and Seth GS Medical College, Mumbai, for which candidates are selected

by application every year. In 2016, IADVL started International Dermatopathology Observership, initiated by Dr Venkataram Mysore with Dr M. Ramam as the program coordinator. It encourages dermatologists who have keen interest in Dermatopathology to obtain training at some of the most reputed centres in USA, Taiwan and Singapore, with partial funding from IADVL. After completing their training, these dermatopathologists are able to mentor their colleagues and juniors and serve for SIG Dermatopathology. Recently in 2021, IADVL advanced training course in

Dermatopathology for 3 months has also been started with structured curriculum devised by SIG Dermatopathology. This can be taken up by dermatologists who have already completed their IADVL observership as it will give them a broader perspective over and above the short duration observerships.

Other educational activities accomplished by SIG Dermatopathology are annual newsletters and Online Training Modules on basic dermatopathology, that are available on IADVL Academy webpage for access by the members, especially the residents. IADVL textbook on Dermatopathology is also currently under process and will be released soon. It will be a handy reference to learn dermatopathology from an Indian perspective.

Skin Allergy Research Society



The Skin Allergy Research Society is an organization dedicated and focused to encourage evidence-based and ethical practice in the treatment of skin allergy disorders including atopic dermatitis, allergic contact dermatitis, angioedema, urticaria and drug allergy.

Through educational activities such as workshops, conferences and publications, the Skin Allergy Research Society strives to spread the knowledge among expert dermatologists interested in treatment of different skin allergic disorders. "Indian Journal of Skin Allergy", an official publication of the society focusing on the latest developments in skin allergies, was recently launched. The first issue of this open access, peer-reviewed journal is published in the month of January 2022.

Skin allergy research society was formed in 2013 with Late. Dr A K Bajaj as president, Dr Kiran Godse as secretary and Dr Vijay Zawar as treasurer.

Indian Association for the Study of Sexually Transmitted Diseases & Aids

Late Dr. C.N. Sowmini, the then Director of the Institute of Venereology, Chennai, founded the Indian Association for the Study of Sexually Transmitted Diseases (IASSTD) in the year 1975. Later, in the year 1993, the name of the association was changed to IASSTD & AIDS. Presently there are 1250 plus life members.


The aim was to organise seminars and other clinical meetings as well as to co-operate and participate with other International Organisations and to hold National Conference annually (ASTICON).



Several Orations such as the 'Silver Jubilee Oration of the Institute of Venereology', 'Dr. R.V.Rajam Endowment Oration', 'Dr. M.A.Wali Oration', 'Dr C W Chacko Memorial Oration' are delivered by eminent speakers at ASTICON.

Dr. P.S.Ranganathan Memorial Prize Competition, Dr.Govindan Nair Memorial Prize Competition, Rabindranath Dutta Memorial competition for post graduate students are the competitions that are being conducted every year.

A biannual journal - the Journal of Sexually Transmitted Diseases (IJSTD) was started in 1980 under the Editorship of Late Dr. Sardarilal. The author of the best article published in IJSTD is awarded the prestigious 'Dr. Sardarilal Award'. Later on the name of the journal was changed to IJSTD & AIDS. Dr. RC Sharma, Dr. Rishi Bhargava and Dr. YS Marfatia (editor from 2006) were the successors to Dr. Sardari Lal.



Pediatric Dermatology

Nearly 10-30% of pediatric primary care visits include a skin-related problem; more so nearly 10-30% of patients attending dermatology outpatient belong to the pediatric age group. This unmet need has been the stimulant for establishing the sub-speciality of pediatric dermatology in recent years. However, the history of evolution of pediatric dermatology worldwide and in India has been a fascinating story.

The description of diseases affecting the children, the diseases affecting the skin, and the disease affecting the skin in children have shadowed each other closely. The term "pediatrics" is derived from the two Greek words,

pais meaning child and iatros meaning doctor and healer - meaning the healer of children. Skin diseases were mentioned in several texts describing the pediatric diseases*, especially in the Edwin Smith (1600 BC) and Ebers (1550 BC) papyri. The Edwin Smith papyrus, also known as Book of Wounds, has been recognized as one of the main medical texts of ancient Egypt, consisting of 48 cases of cutaneous injuries and wounds, many of which occurred during battles and accidents in Egyptian construction sites. An early book on pediatrics came from Rhazes (AD 865-925) who wrote a book entitled Risala fi amraz al atfalwa 'I-'ianayabihim (The Diseases of Children). describing diseases like cradle cap, smallpox, and measles which was followed by work of other authors like Paolo Bagellardo, Metlinger and Roelans.

Like its cousin pediatrics, dermatology too slowly evolved from the historic times to the modern age. The Great "Hippocrates" too wrote about several issues relating to pediatric health and in dermatology, a specialty in which observation is an essential attribute, the hippocratic contributions are also noteworthy where he proposed the first classification of skin diseases. Approximately 100 years after his death, around the 3rd century BC, the texts and theories of Hippocrates were brought together in the Corpus Hippocraticum, one of the first historical milestones of medicine and dermatology. Throughout the 18th and 19th centuries, the study of dermatology intensified in Europe, with dermatologists from the British, French, and Austrian schools establishing the foundations of the science of dermatology, providing discoveries, theories, and knowledge that still reverberate in the specialty. For his valuable contributions, Hebra was recognized in Germanic countries as the founder of classical dermatology, attracting the interest of an entire generation of physicians. In 1827, first ever book on pediatric skin diseases: A treatise on the cutaneous diseases incidental to childhood, was written by Dendy. In another century and half, in 1972, Pediatric dermatology - a fast emerging branch of dermatology was "officially" born.

It is remarkable that all the three oldest trio of Ayurveda, namely Charaka Samhita (Sutra sthanam 30:27), Susruta Samhita (Sutra sthanam1:7), and Vagbhata Samhita (Sutra sthanam1:5) included Kaumarabhritya (Pediatrics) as one of eight main organs of medical science. The Atharva Veda, one of the four Vedas, mentioned about worm infestation in children and an incantation for its treatment. The Garuda Purana described about congenital hemorrhoid of a child, dental caries, inflammation of the palate, erysipelas, diseases causing

ulcerations and blebs on the skin. The Agni Purana contains a full chapter on childhood ailments, and description of diseases enumerated chronologically starting from the very 1st day of life up to 16 years. Navanitakam (3rd or 4th century AD) known in the world of medical history as Bower Manuscript is an invaluable source of Indian medicine. The chapter XIV of this manuscript is fully devoted to pediatric diseases including those of the skin. There were some specialized treatises of Kaumarbhritya, namely Hiranyaksha Tantra, Parvataka Samhita, Jivaka Samhita, Bandhaka Samhita, Kumara Tantra of Ravana, and VriddhaJivakiya Tantra (Kashyap Samhita) Kashyapa Samhita which mentioned leprosy, vicharchika (possibly some blistering disorder), pruritus, boils, visarpa (Erysipelas), urticaria, hyperhidrosis, seborrhiasis capitis (Chikitsa), and charmadala (dermatitis).

Evolution of Pediatric Dermatology Internationally and in India in the 20th and 21st century.

Expanding clinical and academic activity launched professional organizations in the United States and abroad, beginning with the International Society of Pediatric Dermatology, founded during the first

international symposiumin 1973. Drs. Alvin Jacobs, Samuel Weinberg, Nancy Esterly, Sidney Hurwitz, William Weston, and Coleman Jacobson established the SPD (http://www.pedsderm.net) in the United States in 1975. The first certifying examination in pediatric dermatology was administered in Deerfield, Illinois, on October 4, 2004. Eligibility criteria to sit for this examination included ABD certification in general dermatology plus board certification in pediatrics and dermatology, completion of a pediatric dermatology fellowship, or "grandfather" experience.

"Grandfather" eligibility required documentation of at least 5 years of clinical practice that included at least 50% children. In 2000, the subspecialty was recognized as comprising a unique body of knowledge and was formally certified by the Committee on Certification, Subcertification and Recertification of the ACGME.

Evolution of Pediatric Dermatology in India

As already discussed, pediatric medicine was at its nascent stage at the turn of the last century, but there are some great thinkers who could foresee the future. It was Dr. K. C Sahu, who in 1936 wrote an article in the Indian Journal of Venereal Disease and Dermatology entitled "Application of Pediatric Dermatology," highlighting the importance and need of dermatology for pediatric patients. Perhaps the most important event in the recent times in the evolution of Pediatric Dermatology was the establishment of the weekly Pediatric Dermatology clinic at Postgraduate Institute of Medical Education and Research (PGIMER), Chandigarh in Oct-Nov 1987 under the able guidance of the visionary Prof. Dr. Surinder Kaur and a young senior resident at the time Dr. Arti Nanda (who later went on to achieve greater heights in the field later on). Together, they studied and wrote a survey of

cutaneous lesions in Indian newborns. It was certainly a turning point as not only it provided a much-needed recognition to a fledgling speciality but also proved to a platform from which many young Dermatologists developed their careers and in the coming years became leaders in the field both at national and international level. The tradition of pediatric dermatology was carried forward in the department by Prof. Amrinder Jit Kanwar and Prof. Sanjeev Handa, both of whom worked extensively in pediatric atopic eczema and pediatric immunobullous disorders. Some of the alumni from the institute like Dr. Sandeepan Dhar with his pioneer work on atopic dermatitis brought into limelight many aspects of Indian pediatric atopic eczema to the rest of the world. He is also credited with authoring the first Indian book of Pediatric Dermatology in the year 2003 -Color Atlas and Synopsis of Pediatric Dermatology currently in its 4th edition.

The Indian Society of Pediatric Dermatologists (ISPD) established in 1996 by Dr. Deepak Parikh and Prof. Rui Fernandez was another key event as it soon became a Pan India phenomenon.



The 1st National conference of the association was held in November 1996. The next two decades saw a slow evolution with a literature coming from different parts of the country. The Pediatric Dermatology clinic was set up at CMC, Vellore under the leadership of Dr. Renu George in 1997. Dr Rashmi Sarkar was instrumental is setting up a Pediatric Dermatology Clinic in Govt Medical College, Chandigarh, 2002 and at Safdarjung Hospital and VMMC in 2004. Then, in 2010, the Pediatric Dermatology Clinic was set up at JIPMER, Puducherry, and most recently at All India Institute of Medical Sciences, Delhi in 2017.

During this time, some key contributions in genodermatoses was made by Prof Gomathy Sethuraman at All India Institute of Medical Sciences, Delhi. Other important contributions to keep the speciality of pediatric dermatology alive and progressing came from academicians all over India in the form of work by Dr. Rajeev Sharma, Dr. Vibhu mendiratta, Dr. Arun Inamdar and Dr. Aparna Palit to name a few. The Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists, and Leprologists (IADVL) came up with the "Special Interest Group in Pediatric Dermatology in 2016 which was an important initiative as it brought many dermatologists with interest in the field of pediatric dermatology under one umbrella.

In the last decade, progress has been made in formalizing the training of Pediatric Dermatoloy. Perhaps, the first Fellowship in pediatric Dermatology was started in the year 2011 at Bangalore Medical College under the guidance of Prof. Venkatraman Mysore. Thereafter in 2017, it was also initiated at CMC, Vellore under Prof. Renu George, at JIPMER under Prof. Devinder Mohan Thappa, and at Institute of Child Health, Bangalore under Dr. Sahana Srinivas.

It's no surprise that the Pediatric Dermatologists from India are fast becoming leaders at the international stage too. Dr. Arti Nanda is the founder secretary general of International Society of Pediatric Dermatology (ISPD), and the Chairperson of Education Board of ISPD. Dr. Sandipan Dhar very ably represents Indian Pediatric Dermatology as at the chairman of mentorship committee of ISPD. Dr. Rashmi Sarkar is currently Vice President of Asian Society of Pediatric Dermatology and on Board of Directors, Asian Society of Pediatric Dermatology. The future of Pediatric Dermatology appears to be bright and shining.

Omen dermatologists have slowly yet steadily risen up the ranks in the Indian Association of Dermatologists, Venereologists and Leprologists (IADVL). They have contributed immensely as physicians and academicians in dermatology clinics and medical colleges across the country, multitasking as teachers and caregivers, yet leadership and administrative positions traditionally evaded them. Despite being the driving force of various research projects, departments and even organizations, women were and still are under-represented at the forefront. It took 37 years for IADVL to elect a lady president to lead it, the glass ceiling finally broken by an exemplary and visionary leader, Dr. Hemangi Jerajani.

Her grit and determination gave rise to the new woman dermatologist of India who was willing to lead from the front as a leader, mentor and guide.

This chapter is a tribute to the leaders that paved the way for the future generation of women dermatologists in the country. They led by example and inspired countless women doctors to assume leadership positions, take up administrative powers, and realize their full potential.

Although today, there are several women dermatologists heading departmentts, this chapter restricts to those in leadership positions.

Dr. Chedavachi Nelliat Sowmini (M.B.B.S., D.G.O., D.V., M.P.H(USA), Ph.D (Madras), FAMS) (05/01/1922 - 09/01/2012) was one such leader in the pre-IADVL era. She was the first lady medical officer to specialize in the field of Venereology and was awarded a fellowship by the prestigious World Health Organization (WHO) for pursuing her postgraduate degree. Apart from being the director of the Institute of Venereology, Madras Medical college, she was the first woman Medical Superintendent of Government General hospital, Madras.



As a visionary and leader, she was instrumental in the inception of the 'Indian Association for the Study of Sexually Transmitted Diseases' (IASSTD) in 1975, which later came to be known as 'IASSTD and AIDS'. She led the association for eight years as its President. She also started and served as the President of the Women Doctors Association of Tamil Nadu and Pondicherry.

Dr. C. N. Sowmini stood tall at a time when women were primarily confined to their homes. She carved a niche for herself against all odds and left her mark in the field of Venereology. Her teachings and vision stay embedded in the numerous doctors that she taught, guided and inspired.





An avid researcher, she published many firsts from India like direct immunofluorescence in cutaneous lupus erythematosus, a landmark study on human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) seropositivity among patients with sexually transmitted infections (STIs), the efficacy of fixed duration multi-drug therapy (MDT) in paucibacillary leprosy and many more. Professor Mathai was also involved in projects funded by the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) and CMC.

Professor Rachel Mathai (M.B.B.S, DVD, MRCP, FRCP) (22/07/1929 - 6/10/2021) with a career spanning over 60 years was a loved academician, leader and pioneer. She served as the head of the department of Dermatology at Christian Medical College (CMC), Vellore from 1976 to 1989 and was instrumental in starting the postgraduate teaching courses in the institution. As an administrator, she held positions of the Vice-Principal, Medical Superintendent and Associate Director during her tenure in CMC.



IJDVL, May June 1983 issue with Dr. Rachel Mathai as the Managing Editor The Indian Journal of Dermatology, Venereology and Leprology (IJDVL) found its first woman editor in Prof. Rachel Mathai, who held the position from 1977-1983. Her tenure as the first woman editor laid down the foundation for women dermatologists not only in research but also in leadership and administrative roles. She also served as the President of the IADVL Karnataka and Tamil Nadu (TN) branch. Her outstanding work and contribution towards IADVL was honored with the IADVL Lifetime Achievement Award. Other awards bestowed upon her include the Best Teacher Award by IADVL TN branch. The branch also instituted the Dr. Rachel Mathai oration in the year 2013.

Prof. Rachel Mathai was an excellent clinician, healer and a teacher par excellence. Her values, ethics and knowledge stay deeply rooted in all her students. Her contribution towards the growth and development of IADVL and CMC as a woman leader and visionary have been inked in history. Though the involvement of women in research projects and their representation in journal editorial teams has significantly improved over the last few decades, it would still take another forty years for IJDVL to be headed by a woman! Dr. Archana Singal will take over the reins of the journal in the year 2023 as only the second woman Editor-in-chief.

When we think of Stalwarts in the field of Indian Dermatology, **Professor Surinder Kaur** (M.B.B.S, M.D) (07/03/1933- 12/10/2004) stands out as a luminary and charismatic woman leader. She was the force behind the inception of the Department of Dermatology, Venereology and Leprosy at PGIMER, Chandigarh. She served as the only faculty there till 1975 and became the head of the department in 1985. With 28 years of service, she took the department and the field of Dermatology to greater heights. She was awarded the Commonwealth fellowship in 1978, the Kanishka award and the Hari Om Ashram award of the Medical Council of India (MCI) in recognition of her work.

Her body of research work includes various national and international publications with a considerable amount of academic work being in the area of systemic involvement in leprosy. As they say, "Great leaders make more leaders". Prof. Surinder Kaur led by example and her students carry forward that legacy by heading departments and organizations of national and international repute. As a compassionate doctor, a brilliant clinician and a loved mentor, she continues to inspire both men and women in Dermatology.

Dr. K Vimala Bai was one of the first few woman members of the Indian Association of Dermatologists and Venereologists (IADV), before its merger with the Dermatological Society of India to form IADVL as we know it today. Hailing from Secunderabad, she was a representative of the Southern branch in the IADV. She was instrumental in starting the Andhra Pradesh (AP) state branch of IADVL in the year 1973. She was unanimously elected as the first and founding president of the IADVL AP state branch. She led with example and inspired many women leaders not only in her state but the entire country.

The Dermatology fraternity of India chose their first woman leader, Dr. Hemangi Jerajani, in the year 2010, 37 years after the inception of IADVL. Her inspiring journey has empowered many women dermatologists into taking up administrative and leadership roles in the association.

Dr. Hemangi Jerajani (M.B.B.S, D.V.D, M.D) served as the Head of Department at the LTMG college. She, presently is the Head of Department of Dermatology at the MGM Medical college and hospital. She is also an Indian

dermatologist of the international repute. Having served as the Regional Director of International League of Dermatological Societies (ILDS) for South Asia, Middle East and Africa for 2 terms (2011-2019), she became one of the first few globally recognized women dermatologists from the country. She is also a member of the ICDRG

Honors bestowed upon Dr. Hemangi Jerajani include the prestigious 'Maria Duran medal' by the International

Society of Dermatology (ISD) in 2019, Prof. K C Kandhari Foundation National Award and the Best National Teacher Award in 2012. Her tenure as the IADVL president witnessed the inception of the 'Special Interest Groups' or SIGS. She is also an enthusiastic researcher and has various national and international publications to her credit.

IADVL in its golden jubilee year elected its second woman president, 12 years after Dr. Hemangi Jerajani's tenure. **Dr. Rashmi Sarkar** (M.B.B.S, M.D, FAMS) took oath as the second woman leader in office of the second largest dermatologic association of the world in the year 2022. Her ascent in the association is a memorable one as she also holds the position of being the only ever woman Secretary General of IADVL (2014-2015) in fifty years.

Having completed her MD from PGI, Chandigarh, Dr. Rashmi Sarkar is also a passionate academician and

researcher. She has edited 16 books and has numerous publications in both national and international journals. She is presently Director Professor in the Department of Dermatology, Lady Hardinge Medical college, New Delhi. She has actively mentored younger members of the association and is also responsible for empowering various women dermatologists from the country. She was instrumental in starting the Residents Welfare committee along with Residream, a bulletin for the residents, by the residents. The Residents Welfare committee has subsequently been called the National Resident Connect Committee under the IADVL.

Dr. Rashmi Sarkar is also the founder president of the Indian Women's Dermatologic Association (IWDA) which presently has a strength of 100 members but a female dermatologists network of around 250 informally through social media platforms. The IWDA aims at empowering women dermatologists from every nook and corner of the country by presenting to them opportunities for their personal and professional development.

Putting India on the global platform, Dr. Rashmi Sarkar has served as the International Representative from India on the Board of Directors of the Women's Dermatologic Society (WDS) (2011–2013, 2017–2018), as the Vice President (2017-2021) and Director (2021-25) of the International Society of Dermatology. Honors bestowed upon her include the "Maria Duran fellowship" by the International Society of Dermatology (ISD) in 2008, "Member making a

difference award" by the American Academy of Dermatology (AAD) in 2014 and 2015, "Volunteer of the year award" by WDS in 2022, ICMR Lala Ram Chand Kandhari Award (2020) and Dr. B M Ambady Oration by IADVL in 2020. As a true visionary she hopes to build and strengthen the future leaders of the association and has initiated various Mentorship and leadership programs under the aegis of IADVL for the same. Her journey, resolve and determination have inspired various women dermatologists in the country to follow their dreams both at the national and international platforms.

The past few years have seen a progressive increase in the number of women taking up Dermatology as a post graduate subject. With the right amount of medicine, surgery and aesthetics, Dermatology is now a coveted branch among the post graduate aspirants. Despite being present in good numbers in dermatology departments, women hesitate to take up administrative and leadership roles. The possible reasons for the same could include inability to strike a work life balance, added responsibility, competing time demands especially if there are children involved and burn out. This can be effectively tackled with education, mentoring, counseling, support groups and encouragement from one's family where chore sharing can be of great help. A lot of women dermatologists from our country have overcome challenges and hurdles to become leaders of tomorrow. With a slow yet persistent change in our society, women have now come to the forefront to head their departments, associations and organizations. Over the years, gender representation has also improved in the IADVL with men and women having equal and important roles to play. With values like empathy, compassion, effective decision making and determination, women leaders strive to empower more and more women to achieve their goals. With so many luminaries as our guiding light, the women dermatologists of India have a bright future ahead of them.


To increase awareness, cooperation and communication among the Indian Dermatologists and reach the community to promote high-quality education, clinical care, research and innovation that will improve skin health nationally and globally. We want to attain the best possible skin health for all people around the nation. Through activities, we will try to improve the dermatological care of patients in under-served areas of the country. We will try to focus on the special dermatological issues

under the community dermatology programme. The prime focus area were Geriatric Skin Health, Paediatric Skin Health, Occupational Skin Health, prisoner's Skin Health, LGTB Skin Health, Topical Steroid Misuse awareness, Tinea awareness, Leprosy awareness, Skin & Mental Health awareness, Hair care any other relevant topics.

The work to this point has made significant strides in spreading awareness, improving quality of life, creating greater flexibility in how doctors work and connect with the community to enable more reach; ensuring consistent and supportive assessment of medical problems faced by people; providing greater support and platform to future doctors in the early stages of their careers; and more recently, working with the government health care system and different national and regional bodies to serve the community better.

While we keep delivering and customising our programs as per the society's requirements, we can club the initiatives under ten major buckets:

IADVL Chala Gaon Ki Ore: This was the brainchild of Late Dr Amar Kant Jha. Under this banner, a team of doctors visit the interiors of the state to not only just helps patients with their medical conditions but also demonstrate to positively influence patient behaviour and reduce the risk of medical negligence. It serves as a great platform to eliminate potential "fake news" and superstitions related to diseases. It was aimed at conducting community events across India to help rural and tribal areas where dermatology care is not available. Nearly thirty events were held all over India and the program was a resounding success. IADVL Bihar state branch along with other branches led this programme successful Bihar state was awarded Best Community Dermatology Award in the year 2016, 2017 & 2020. Dr Sanjeev Vaishampayam (2019), Dr P D Joshi Patodekar (2020), Dr Saumil Anupam Desai (2021) & DR Vivek V Pai (2022) were awarded DERMASEWA Award for their contributions in the field of community dermatology in India



IADVL Chala Apno Ke Beech: It was initiated by Dr. Vikas Shankar as Convener of community Dermatology 2021 along with Chairperson Dr. Deeksha M, under the leadership of Dr. Jayadev Betkerur and Dr. Feroz K and then IADVL EC. It was means to serve the IDVL entire family specially in the difficult pandemic COVID-19 times. Under this banner during the covid-19 crisis, lots of PPEs, oxygen concentrators, and monetary help to affected family members were provided.

Social welfare: IADVL is always looking for ways to reach out to society at times of crisis and mitigate future risks. During the covid-19 crisis, several initiatives were taken to distribute PPE kits and food packets. During several other occasions like women's day etc, we ensure to visit colleges, institutes or nearby locality to help people.

Newsletter & Educational Awareness Brochure & Video: We keep developing content for the awareness of internal and external team members. Newsletters, Patient education booklet available on the website are such few initiatives. Responsible skin care educational video: declares that "Dermatologist is the true skin specialist; Dermatologist is the true cosmetologist; Dermatologist is the true trichologist" were released and circulated among derma fraternity. IADVL educational leaflets: IADVL has released educational leaflets with freaquetly asked questions along with Do's and Don'ts on 38 skin diseases.

Urban Health Camps: Community dermatology as a platform is enabling the doctors to work with communities to deliver healthcare in urban areas that optimally uses resources to improve the physical, mental and social wellbeing of the whole population they serve. Health camps are enabling us to minimise inequity and reduce health inequalities within and across a defined population. Providing free check-ups and free medicines is our way to reduce inequality.


Awareness Drive:

We are moving in times where changing medical and social perspectives will value holistic rather than disease-centred medicine. Through various awareness drives and camps, community dermatology is prompting a shift towards health promotion and social accountability. Spreading awareness on certain days like AIDS day, Women's day, Vitiligo Day, Psycho Dermatology Patient Care Day, and World Urticaria Day etc has been a great success. On a few occasions, the awareness drives under Prabhat Pheri & Nukkad Natak take a creative form. Prabhat Pheri is the awareness walk early morning and Nukkad Natak is a way to showcase medical issues using small open area drama performances.

Conference: We are regularly conducting Skin Health RUN in different conferences with different aims matching with the IADVL theme of the year. With the help of print and social media, we try our best to share the latest and right information with society.



Community Dermatology committee headed by chairperson and convener with eminent enthusiastic

IADVLites as members. The committee has tenure of 1 year.

The AIDS epidemic was a test for IADVL. Many of our members took up caring AIDS patients. They were actively involved in educating people about the dreadful disease. Thousands of these unfortunate people benefited by their work. Dr. Saple, Dr Maniar, Dr Ravi V, Dr. Jayadev Betkerur, Dr. Venkatramana, Dr. Amar Kant Jha 'Amar" and many more made their name in HIV care at the height of AIDS epidemic when lack of care and ignorance were prevalent.

Our members took on the fight against COVID19 pandemic in war footing. IADVL recognised the lack of man and material in this battle. Out foot soldiers, young PLMs, were in the fore front of taking care of COVID





Quoting Dr Rashmi Sarkar, who rightly mentioned during her tenure as Honorary Secretary General IADVL, "Watch out for the residents of the maiden committee. 5 years down the line, they will be serving our association in their best possible abilities and they would prove to be assets for IADVL".

Youth Initiatives Part II

The Yuva Cell Journey: From a flamboyant idea to a mainstream committee!

The author distinctly recalls his interactions with Dr. Godse on many matters pertaining to IADVL - he was, after all, one of the two reasons the former had joined the fold as an executive, in the first place. During one such interchange on a sultry day in Mumbai, Dr. Godse spoke of a whim that they had thought up a while ago - the thought of a cell dedicated to the youth, to reach out to and empower the young ones, redress their grievances, act as a sounding board and a bridge between higher management and the youth. With this exact intent in mind, a proposal was floated in the annual general

body meeting in 2020 and the house unanimously agreed, albeit, for a trial period of one year. And herein, the YUVA Cell was born - of the youth, by the youth, and for the youth. As the founding chairperson, an entire spectrum of emotions came over me, the author was thrilled at the opportunity, yet weary at the prospect of us having under 365 days to prove ourselves as a permanent committee. To make matters worse, COVID-19 struck as the committee was laying down the foundation for the Yuva cell. The Yuva Cell had to unlearn and relearn the roadmap, and adapt to the rapidly changing environment. Luckily, the cell had literal pillars of strength - the forerunner being Dr. Rashmi Sharma as the convenor, who has contributed as much, if not more, to giving physical shape to the vision and mission that was conceived on paper. Next, the



senior advisors – nothing short of visionaries - Dr. Rashmi Sarkar, Dr. Nina Madnani, Dr. Shyamanta Barua, Dr. Suneil Gandhi and Dr. Suruchi Garg who paved the way forward, each step of the way, with their wholehearted support. The workforce of the cell were the zonal coordinators - Dr. Bhushan Madke (W), Dr. Anupam Das (E), Dr. Deepak Jakhar (N) and Dr. Sujala S Aradhya (S), Dr. Veenu Jindal (C), who were there whenever they were called upon to help. The committee had a team of 23 additional members, over and above, and apologies are begged herewith, for not naming each one in this writeup owing to paucity of space - all of you know who you are and how you have contributed to the cause!

But did the cell achieve what was expected of it?

- 1. A separate database of members under the age of 40 was created. (3869 members). Many of them were reached out to personally to invite them to lead, speak and contribute (even if as ordinary members as these are as/more important as the executives leading them!)
- 2. An Instagram page and a Facebook page dedicated to the youth was initiated, which is still quite active, two years hence!
- 3. A separate logo for the Yuva Cell were adopted, invited as a competition between young members. The one designed by Dr Ishmeet Kaur was chosen, and the cell sent the same for EC approval.
- 4. One of the initiatives that marked the maiden tenure was the "QuaranTEN" series, conceived by Dr. Madhulika Mhatre, Dr. Aseem Sharma and Dr. Rashmi. The aim was to bring to the user's living rooms honest and non-pharmaceutical-led sessions on various topics academic and non-academic to create academic content. All virtual. All on a dedicated platform owned the cell. A total of 26 sessions were done, which continue to be viewed even today, on the following topics:




- 1. Another planned venture was the release of the 1st ever Yuva Bulletin on 8th August 2020. The highlights of the issue were


IADVL Guruderma program



A cherry on top was the physical meeting that was arranged between each mentee and their guru.





Changes that can be anticipated are:

- 1. Changes in dermatology education
- 4. Changes in memberships
- 2. Changes in dermatology practice
- 5. Changes in society
- 3. Changes in administration of IADVL
- 6. IADVL in global arena

Dermatology education:

Dermatology is changing and teaching needs to change. As dermatosurgery, aesthetic dermatology and other subspecialities develop rapidly, dermatology teaching in medical colleges may find itself inadequate. IADVL will have to enhance online teaching programs further. It will also have to be assertive and aggressive in pushing the case for dermatology education both in undergraduate and postgraduate education with governmental agencies. Fellowship

courses have to be pushed further.

IADVL can also look at starting

fellowship programs of its own.

Dermatology practice: This is the area which will throw up the biggest challenges:

- a. Quackery is on the rise as dermatology, particularly with cosmetic dermatology becoming every one's baby, and with all and sundry encroaching on to the arena of dermatologists
- b. Online apps equipped with AI, with promise of very low fee or even free consultations, home visits and home treatments even for procedures
- c. Influence of social media with rating, reviews and influencers ruling the roost
- d. All and machine learning can have the positive effect of making dermatology- a visual and visible speciality-accessible, but also has the negative effect of machine diminishing the role of a dermatologist
- e. Doctor abuse, medicolegal issues have begun to have a depressing influence on the morale of doctors, and as dermatological treatments tend to become more interventionist, this is likely to get enhanced further. Who can forget-the highest ever compensation ordered in India in a medicolegal case is for a dermatology case?

IADVL membership:

Welfare of members will become an increasingly important area of focus in several areas: Scholarships, insurance schemes, financial and legal help for members in distress, help in case of doctor abuse, providing and training in tools for practice. Increasing number of members are women with special needs and concerns.

IADVL in the global arena:

IADVL has grown in to a very influential organization in global dermatology. It will further enhance this role, partly because of the number and more because of the improving academic content of Indian dermatology. Dermacon International will rival AAD and EADV and soon, World congress of Dermatology will be organized in India.

IADVL and society:

As image of doctors in the society comes under onslaught in several ways, trust dwindles and with increasing focus by authorities on alternative medicine and society hankering after pseudoscience dished out by social media, IADVL will have to play an active rule to combat misinformation, provide the right information, target social ills, provide help to poor patients through programs such as IADVL chalo Gaon ki ore, make dermatology accessible in an equitable manner and everywhere through judicious use of technology.



IADVL administration:

In order to meet these challenges IADVL needs to enhance itself and equip itself with necessary administrative tools. The current model of volunteers doing major part of the work in IADVL may not work for long if the younger dermatologists focus more on their career and less on their parent organization IADVL

- a. Office, a long held dream which was realized recently needs to be equipped with right staff
- b. Automation of the office and use of technology
- c. Financial administration will need special attention. Scrutiny on pharma contributions, increase in online meetings, dwindling interest rates on deposits may need change in financial strategies with experts and advisors advising IADVL
- d. Decision making IADVL has been a very vibrant democratic organization, but there is need to make the decision making sharper, based on proper data, broader participation and informed membership opinions.

There are exciting developments and demands- there are also concerns and challenges on the horizon.

IADVL will have to evolve, adapt, and develop to meet these head on- to remain relevant, influential, and impressive.
